FORTNIGHTLY PAY FOR RAILWAY MEN.

Liberal-Conservatives in the House Stand Up for the Working-men. Opposition Advocate Weekly Pay for Miners, Fort-nightly Pay for Railway Men, Abolition of Truck System and an Effective Workmen's Compensation Act.

The Liberal-Conservative Opposition in the Assembly are showing themselves keenly alive to the interests of the workingmen and the importance of intelligent labor legislation.

Among the measures promoted this session by Conservative members in the interests of the working men of the Province were resolutions introduced favoring weekly pay for miners, to take effect at once, the abolition of the truck system, and the payment in cash to all employees of corporations and the demand of the immediate enforcement of the Workmen's Compensation Act

Act
An important Bill, looking to the interests of the railway men of the Province, was introduced by Mr. J. C. Douglas, Conservative member for Cape Breton, and has been passed by the Assembly. It provides for fornightly pay to all employees of all company railroads operating within the Province of Nova Scotia under Provincial charter. The provisions of the Bill are as follows:

"Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly

as follows:
Chapter 99 of the Acts of the Revised Statutes of Nova
Scotia is hereby amended by adding thereto the following

Scotia is hereby amended by adding thereto the following clauses:

1.—The wages of every person employed on or about a railway shall be paid twice in each month, at intervals as nearly as possible of half a month.

2.—At each of such times of payment the wages of such employee shall be paid up to the time of the last preceding time of payment, and any employee who is absent at any such time of payment shall at any time thereafter, on demand be entitled to be paid his wages up to such last preceding time of payment. time of payment.

3—The owner, agent, superintendent or manager of any railway who contravenes or fails to comply with this section shall each be guilty of an offence against this Chapter.

4.—In cases of any proceeding instituted in respect of an offence against this section,—

. (a) Three days' notice of the intention to institute such proceeding shall be given to such owner agent, superintendent or manager;

(b) Every such proceeding shall be instituted within thirty days from the commission of the offence charged;

(c) The owner, agent, superintendent or manager accused shall not be permitted to set up by way of defence any agreement of hiring inconsistent with this section, and (d)—Any penalty recovered shall be paid to the treasurer of any municipality or town through which the railway runs in respect to which the offence was committed is situated."

This measure is a reform of the most important character and will be welcomed by all railway employees in the Province. Its provisions are broad enough to include not only conductors, brakesmen and train-hands, but all persons employed in any apacity on any compny owned railroad operating in Nova Scotia under Provincial charter.

Judging by the deluge of complimentary letters which have poured in upon the member for Cape Breton, who is the sponsor for this measure, the Act is evidently an immensely popular one among railway men throughout the Province.


