The firing aroused Broke, who was seated half unconscious on a carronade slide. He faintly directed the Americans to be driven into the hold, and then lapsed, from his great loss of blood, into total insensibility. The battle may be said to have now ended, and that, too, in thirteen minutes time from its beginning. In that brief period 252 men were either killed or wounded in the two ships. In the great fight off Cape St. Vincent the total loss was 296. At the battle of Navarino the whole loss was 27.
