SNUBBED BY THE KAISER.

HE DECLINES TO RECEIVE OOM PAUL-KITCHENER'S CAMPAIGN IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Berlin, Dec. 3. - Mr. Kruger has therefore proceed direct from Cologne for Holland. He telegraphed to this effect last evening. The Emperor's intimation was conveyed to Mr. Kruger by the German envoy at Luxemburg, who arrived at Cologne yesterday. The Cologne Gazette, in an inspired communique, says: —
"Mr. Kruger's visit is not agreed able to Germany, his aim being to obtain intervention in South Africa. It would be a grave political mistake, it would be even a great crime, to allow him to entertain even a spark of hope that Germany will render him any practical support." This declara-tion is accompanied with reproaches, Mr. Kruger being charged with "having encouraged a useless guerilla warfare, and having disregarded Ger-many's advice when he might still have followed it." Bloemfontein, Orange River Colony, Dec. 3. — A patrol of fourteen South African constabulary during the night of Nov. 28 engaged a contingent from Haaseboek's commando, south-west-ward of this town, with the result that 35 Boers are reported to have

been killed or wounded.

London, Dec. 3,-Gen. Kitchener's first bulletin is businesslike and terse. It is dated from Bloemfontein, and opens with a summary of Knox's rearowing to the receipt of an official intimation that Emperor William regrets that, in consequence of previous arrangements, he will be unable to receive him. The Boer statesman will ous Boer leader by relays of mounted men continually reinforced and re-lieved. The capture of De Wet and Steyn is clearly the first great stroke which he has in mind, and the same tactics of sending out mobile columns of a thousand men and keeping them of a thousand men and keeping them in mption on the trail of the com-mandoes will be adopted elsewhere. This is indicated by his account of Paget's severe fighting with Viljoen and Erasmus, and his comment that Lyttleton is co-operating with the British flying column. The success of the Boer leaders in keeping their forces in the field when they have forces in the field when they have been cut off from every base of supplies is explained by veteran soldiers on the theory that there are usecret storage places for provisions and ammunition, to which they return from time to time. If this be true operations will be gradually narrowed down to a few districts where stores have been buried. Kitchener's work will be simplified by the division of the Dutch territory into districts where columns of mounted men can follow up the guerilla bands, and wear out their powers of resistence. Fresh ralays of horses, if they can get them, will bring this murderous sport of fox-hunting to a close.

He Inspects Some of the Famous South African Battle Fields.

Ladysmith, Natal, Dec. 3.—Lord Roberts, who arrived here on Friday, had inspected Majuba and Langs Nek while en route. Replying to an address from the townspople here, he expressed his admiration of the gallant defence of the town, which he characterized as a "glorious mewhich he characterized as a "glorious me-morial of British pluck and endurance, only equalled by the determination and bravery of the relieving force." He said he trusted the day was not far distant when peace would reign supreme and "without ill-feeling toward a conquered foe." Lord Roberts has visited Colenso and the sur-rounding bathlefields.

KRUGER FEELS BURT

At Being Snubed by the German Emperor -What the Snur Means

NEW EGG CORNER

One Has Been Made in Chicago Which the Armours Control

It is Said the Packing House Interests Have Already Made Half a

Chicago, Dec. 3 .- The Times-Herald says :- A corner has been made on eggs. The price is now 19c a doz., and how high it will go no one but the men who are engineering the deal, can tell. The men, Armour, Swift, and other packers and dealers, who control the corner, have already made about half a million dollars, and their profits have only begun. The deal is of such proportions that it makes the Phillips corner on corn seem insignificant. The deal has been engineered by the packers, Armour and Swift, who are the largest owners of refrigerator cars in the country and who have fa-

cars in the country and who have facilities for handling eggs to better advantage than regular dealers. There is also a combination in the Western Cold Storage Co., the Monarch Refrigerator Co., Purcell & Tinkham and C. H. Weaver & Co., all of Chicago; Haskell & Bosworth, of Beatrice, Neb., who buy at 150 stations in the country, are also heavily interested.

Prices have advanced from 13 to 19c in the past two months, and prospects are for a still higher range. The consumption of eggs has been very heavy, and the prices of fresh eggs have kept up between 20c and 23c, for the past few weeks, which is unusual, owing to a scarcity. Not more than 2,500 cases of strictly fresh eggs are held in Chicago to-day.
