KAMIMURA'S VICTORY

Japan has learned a lesson by the victory of Admiral Kamimura—a lesson in Western ways and in condemnation of the old ideas that governed her.

When the Admiral failed to hold the Vladivostok fleet in check some time ago Japan forgot her newly acquired Westernisms, and the leading newspapers editorially called upon him to show his regret by disemboweling himself. But Kamimura did not revert to the old Japanese practice. He followed the European custom of remaining alive and seeking to retrieve his failure. His corpse could not serve his country. He sought his chance and found it, and Japan will honor him for his signal victory. There will be an end soon to calls from Japan for her sons who fail in anything to commit hari-kari, and it will be recognized that as a matter of value a live man is worth more than a dead one.

HE FORGOT HIMSELF.

Judge Parker, the Democratic candidate, is the champion of law and order, points out The Toronto Star. He views with alarm the shooting and killing incident to strike riots, the lynching of negroes in the South, the general disrespect for law evinced by men and communities in the United States. Being a judge by profession, as one might say, these views are natural to him, and those who view the Republic from a distance will be inclined to say that the nation needs a judge in the Presidential chair to re-establish the supremacy of Law over Force.

Senator Champ Clark is chairman of the Democratic National Committee. In other words, he is manager of Judge Parker's campaign in favor of law, and order, and in condemnation of violence and disrespect for law, whether shown in the strike riots in Chicago and Colorado, or in the hasty burning of negroes in the South on suspicion of crimes which they may or may not have committed.

At a meeting in Indiana the other night Senator Champ Clark made a speech in favor of law and order. He denounced ex-Governor Taylor as an assassin, and charged that the Republicans were protecting a man who merited hanging. The Republicans, he said, wanted to rule the country by assassination.

"You're a liar," shouted a Republican from the body of the hall. Up to this point Senator Clark had been uttering Parkerism, but here the natural man rushed from cover. "If the man who just called me a liar," he shouted, "will meet me outside the park when I finish my speech, I'll cut his throat from ear to ear."

Sensor Champ Clark, manager of Judge Parker's campaign against violence and disrespect for law and order, has lost his usefulness. If he had threatened to pull the nose of the other man it would have been different, but the punishment he spoke of was so condign and circumstantial that the sins of ex-Governor Taylor and others dwindled to nothing.

Judge Parker may as well ask for the resignation of Senator Champ Clark and his razor. His campaign cannot carry the Senator and his weapon.
