The Supreme Executive, in December, 1898, declined an invitation to take a larger interest in the Provincial Trust Co. Subsequently representations were made to him by preminent members of the order of the advisability of making some hetter prevision for members of the order of the advisability of making some better prevision for investing the surplus funds of the order, and in January, 1900, a resolution was passed by the Executive authorizing the purchase from time to time of stock in the Provincial Trust Co. until a controlling interest was acquired. Mr. Wm. Laidlaw, K. C., to whom the task of securing the stock was entrusted, advised that a new company be formed, and the Union Trust Co. was the result.

The composition of the board of management was to include Messrs. Foster, Stevenson, Wilson, McGillivray and the witness.

The Union Trust Co. was incorporated on Aug. 7, 1902, and the capital stock was placed at \$1,000,000. This was afterwards raised to \$2,000,000.


