International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—Jesus feeds the five thousand—Matt. 14, 13-23 and John 6, 1-13.

Golden Text—"Jesus said unto them, 'I am the bread of life.'"

All four evangelists record this miracle. No wonder the people would take him by force and make him king. The pity and sympathy of our Lord brought this about. He is the same Saviour to-day. Note the order and promptness with which they were fed.

These two miraculous plagues—see Matt. 15, 38—in which Jesus feeds 5,000 and 4,000—compare with Acts 2, 41 and 4, 14—give us a missionary model of how to feed earth's millions with the bread of life. All the youth had been surrendered and brought to Jesus. He blessed and broke and gave to the 12 disciples to act as waiters; they do not first help themselves, afraid there's not enough to go round, but in faith minister to every group until every hungry man is fed, and then they have a basketful each left.

There's many a one to whom Jesus has given the holy hunger to feed the soul hunger of men, who neglect or despise their calling, do not walk after their spirit, but after the flesh and grieve the spirit; who are now hungry when they might, like these disciples with their full baskets, have a heart overflowing with love, have been fruitful and obedient.

For 19 centuries the nations have been "sitting perishing in darkness and the shadow of death," while "two whose souls are lighted from wisdom from on high" have been fed, feasted and over-fed until we are spiritual dyspeptics for want of exercise, and our Bible societies, Tract societies and Missionary societies for which we all thank God—have only here and there touched comparatively a few starving groups, while the great majority are living and dying in darkness at the rate of one for every beat of the pulse.
