The Farm Boys Cavaliers.

A letter has been received from the Minnesota University Farm at St. Paul, Minn., regarding the organization of farm boys, which is reproduced below but with the suggestion that a junior auxiliary of the body may well be formed with younger boys as members, boys of the age when a Shetland pony is suitable mount, to give them the mental education in the saddle which cannot be given at too early an age.

Take a group of farm boys, put them in uniforms, mount them on horses, pledge them to the service of God and country and their fellows, interest them in their own and farm activities, and encourage them by promise of promotion to a higher rank for achievements in certain lines of rural activities—do all this and you have a troop of Farm Boy Cavaliers.

The Farm Boy Cavaliers of America is a new order for the brightening and betterment of boy life on the farms, planned and organized by D. D. Mayne, principal of the School of Agriculture of the University of Minnesota. The idea for a separate order for farm boys corresponding to the Boy Scouts, whose work appeals chiefly to boys of towns and cities, rather than the boys of the open country, took shape in the mind of Prof. Mayne, after a careful study of the reasons of the lack of interest among farm boys in the Boy Scout movement. Prof. Mayne felt that such an organization, that life could be more enjoyable for them and that they could be moved to useful activities in much the same way as the boys in the Boy Scout movement. Consequently he set to work to formulate a plan.

Today 100 young men from the Minnesota School of Agriculture are out over the north-west organizing troops of Farm Boy Cavaliers. It is his belief, from the way things are going in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and North Dakota many troops will be organized; that each of those States will then form a State organization; that other States will take up the work, and that when seven States have formed organizations, a national order will be formed with headquarters in the office of the leader in Washington City.

The plan for the Farm Boy Cavaliers so successfully started is worthy of explanation. Any four farm boys, each of whom has the use of a horse for riding, may form a troop. The members will meet on horseback, elect a leader, an assistant leader, a secretary and a treasurer. They will then take the pledge of the order, sign their names to the roll, giving their post office addresses. A copy of the roll will then be sent to the Secretary of State of the Farm Boy Cavaliers, at the College of Agriculture, University Farm, St. Paul, from whom blanks and detailed information may be obtained. The general organization corresponds to that of the United States Government; each State organization to have its own State Government.

Boys entering the organization will take the rank of page. No one will be accepted who cannot ride a horse at a gallop, and no one under the age of 12. A page may become an equite by being able to repeat the pledge and his 12 principles (if the order, by earning at least five achievement badges, and by having not less than \$50 on deposit in his own name in some bank, or invested in some farm project. An equite may become a knight by earning at least seven additional achievement badges, and by having at least \$100 in bank or in some farm project.

The Cavalier's pledge reads: "I pledge my word of honor that I will do my best to serve my God, my country, and all persons who need my service; that I will keep myself clean in body and in mind, and that I will observe the principles of the Farm Boy Cavaliers."

The Cavalier's 12 principles are service, preparedness, personal honor, obedience, loyalty, kindness and charity, courtesy, courage, industry, thrift, cleanliness and reverence. Achievement badges are won by work in alfalfa or clover growing, applied chemistry, automobile operation, berry growing, barnyard sanitation, bee culture, beef calf feeding, bird study, blacksmithing, canning, carpentry, cement construction, civic effort, corn growing, entomology, farm accounting, forestry, harness mending, milk production, painting, poultry raising, and similar farm activities.

Memorial to Britain's Bravest Boy.

The passage in Rear Admiral Baitly's dispatch on the North Sea fight, which appeals to commentators and stirs all England is that in which the Admiral pays a tribute to the heroism of a boy, John Travers Corwall, of H. M. S. Chester, who was mortally wounded early in action. The Admiral says: "He nevertheless remained standing alone at a most exposed post during the action with the gun crew dead and wounded all around him." Corwall joined the navy in August 1915 and went into the training school. He had been at sea only a few weeks when he was killed. The captain of the Chester, in a letter to the boy's mother, says: "He remained steady at his most exposed post at the gun waiting for orders. His gun would not bear on the enemy. All but two of the gun crew were killed and he was the only one who was in such an exposed position, but he felt he might be needed and indeed he might have been; so he stood there standing and waiting until a heavy fire with just his own brave heart and God's help to support him. I cannot express to you my admiration of the son you have lost from this world. I hope to place in the boy's mess a plate with his name and the date and the words: 'faithful unto death.'"

Jellicoe Submits Official Report.

In eliminating unnecessary work and expenditure, it cannot be said that the nation is taking its part in the greatest duty that has ever fallen to its share.

Admiral Jellicoe estimates the German losses at two battleships of the dreadnaught type, one of the Deutschland type, which was seen to sink; the battle cruiser, Lutzow, admitted by the Germans; one battle cruiser, seen to be so severely damaged that its return was extremely doubtful; the battleship, the Goeben, one of these possibly a battleship—six destroyers, seen to sink; three destroyers, so damaged that it was doubtful if they would be able to reach port, and a submarine sunk. Commenting on this, Admiral Jellicoe says:

"The conditions of low visibility, under which the day action took place, and the approach of darkness, enhanced the difficulty of giving an accurate report of the damage inflicted or the names of the ships sunk by our forces. But, after a most careful examination of the evidence of all the officers, who testified to seeing enemy vessels actually sink, and personal interviews with a large number of these officers, I am of opinion that the list shown in the enclosure gives the minimum numbers, though it is possible it is not accurate as regards the particular class of vessel especially those which were sunk during the night attack. It is a questionable matter that many other ships were very seriously damaged by gunfire and torpedo attack."
