TEUTON OFFER BOGUS
Christiania, April 27.—The German official announcement of a safe conduct for neutral steamships leaving British ports on May 1 is regarded by the Norwegian press as a repetition of the bogus offer of last March, nullified by impossible conditions. No Norwegian shipowners have accepted the German offer.

GAS ATTACK ON OTTAWA PARLIAMENT
Ottawa, April 27.—A plot to subject the Canadian Parliament to a poison gas attack tonight reported to have been discovered by the Montreal police, had failed to materialize at a late hour last night. A heavy guard had been quickly thrown about the government building.

THREE TIMES WINNER
Howard Berry, the University of Pennsylvania football star, baseball player and National Guardsman, yesterday at Philadelphia for the third successive year won the college pennant championship at the twenty-third annual relay carnival on Franklin Field. He captured four of the five events comprising the pentathlon and finished third in the other—the discus throw. The performances, with a few exceptions, were only fair. W. B. Overbee, of Illinois, an added entry, made a new collegiate record of 43 feet 4 1/2 inches in the running hop step and jump.

NEW YORK LEADS IN NATIONAL LEAGUE
With twenty hits, four of them three-baggers to his credit in twelve games, Roush, of Cincinnati, is out in front for batting honors in the National League according to unofficial averages, including games of Wednesday, April 25, announced today.

Jack Smith of St. Louis and Griffith, of Cincinnati, however, have played in fewer games than Roush, are batting .667 and .500 respectively. Smith has made only six trips to the plate and Griffith twelve, as against forty-two for the Cincinnati player.

New York is leading in club batting with .290 and Chicago in fielding with .971. SCOTTISH FOOTBALLERS REDUCE THEIR CIRCUIT
At a special meeting of the Scottish Football league committee to consider the competition of the league for the season 1917-18, the following motion was carried: "That the three clubs, Aberdeen, Dundee and Raith Rovers, be asked to refrain from taking part in next season's competition, on condition that the charges of these clubs, based on the average of the last three years, be met by the clubs carrying on the competition." Restrictions in railway travelling and difficulty in raising teams to travel are the chief reasons for this decision.

SPEAKER AWAY IN FRONT IN AMERICAN LEAGUE
In the American League, Speaker, of Cleveland, the 1916 batting champion, continues in the lead with an average of .429, although W. Johnson, of Philadelphia, and Ruml, of St. Louis, pinch-hitters, batted .600 and .500 respectively in five games. Speaker has played in twelve games, going to bat forty-two times. Cobb, of Detroit, in forty trips to the plate, is batting .350. Philadelphia and Boston with a percentage of .252 are tied for the leading club batting. Chicago, which led at the start of the race, is sixth. Leading batters are: W. Johnson Philadelphia, .600; Ruml, St. Louis, .500; Speaker, Cleveland, .429; Menosky, Washington, .400; Banforth, Chicago, .400; McInnes, Philadelphia, .396; Peckinpah, New York, .371; Foster, Washington, .364; Hoblitzel, Boston, .355; Cobb, Detroit, .350.

Every pitcher who has appeared so far has won at least one game. Babe Ruth, of the Red Sox, is showing the way for hurlers in both leagues. He has won four and lost none. Anderson, Giants; Schupp, Giants; Doak, Cardinals and Barnes, Braves, have each won two and lost none in the National League.

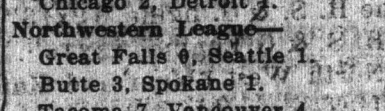
