**SYKOPSIS OF CANADIAN HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.**

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.  
Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.  
The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:  
(1). At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.  
(2). A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.  
(3). If the father (or mother if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).  
(4). The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.  
(5). A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.  
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

**Goal Strike Possible**

INDIANAPOLIS, Thursday. — The National convention of the United Mine Workers of America met today in Tomlinson Hall to agree upon a course of action because of the failure of the operators and miners of the Central competitive field to agree upon a joint wage conference to fix a scale in place of the present one which expires April 1st. The wage scale for the various bituminous fields of the United States and Canada are based upon the scale fixed in the Central competitive field, consisting of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Western Pennsylvania.  
It is thought probable that President Mitchell will advocate the adoption of one of the first two policies, expecting by pursuing that course to induce some of the operators to sign a scale and put their mines in operation which the miners believe would force the others to do likewise.  
There is a disposition on the part of some of the coal operators to stimulate coal market prices in this manner or by the threat of bringing on such a strike, said Mr. Mitchell. "And it looks now as though there would be a full suspension of mining in all these great bituminous fields on April 1st."

**AN UNIQUE RECORD.**  
(Morning Graphic.)  
When Hon. C. R. Devlin took his seat in the Legislative Assembly of Quebec at the opening of its session a day or two ago, he made an unique record in the history of Parliament. He had within two years been elected at three elections and had taken his seat for the third time during the session of Parliament to which he had been elected. The first of these occasions was in the Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, when he was presented as member for Galway, by Mr. P. O'Brien, M. P., for Kilkenny and by Captain Donaldson, M. P., for Cork. The second was last year when, after his election to the Canadian House of Commons for Nicolet, he was introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux; and the third came when he took his seat in the Legislative Assembly of Quebec as member for Nicolet and Minister of Colonization and was championed by Hon. Lomer Gouin and Hon. Adolphe Turgeon. But these are not Mr. Devlin's only claims to hold Parliamentary records. Although still only a young man, he has won six elections and taken his place six times in the various Parliaments. The first was in the Canadian House of Commons as M. P. for the county of Ottawa in 1891; the second as M. P. for Wright at Ottawa in 1896; the third again as member for Galway at Westminster in 1903; the fourth at Westminster in 1903; the fifth at Ottawa as M. P. for Nicolet in 1907; and the sixth at Quebec as M. P. P., for Nicolet in 1908. If there is any other Parliamentarian in the British Empire with a similar record, we should like to hear of him.

**CHIEF JUSTICE BANQUETED.**  
A Hundred Leading Lawyers attended Dinner in His Honor.

ST. JOHN, Thursday. — The banquet given by the Bar of the Province to the new Chief Justice at the Union Club tonight was a brilliant and successful function. About a hundred leading lawyers were present. M. G. Teed, president of the New Brunswick barriesters' society, presided. Leading legal lights from all parts of the province were in attendance including several New Brunswick judges.

**Chilean Soldiers**

**Win Great Victory**  
Reported to Have Massacred Some Two Thousand Unarmed Strikers

SAN FRANCISCO, Thursday. — Machine guns operated by the government forces of Chile in a great conflict with strikers at the Nitra beds and in the City of Iquique laid 2500 men low, most of whom were killed according to advices received yesterday by the Norwegian steamer Christian Bora, which arrived today direct from Chile. Business at Iquique which had never before been scarcely disturbed by anything but earthquakes was paralyzed when the great army of workers went on a strike. One fracas after another occurred until soldiers and strikers met in the streets of Iquique and on the outskirts and openly defied each other. Being ordered to disperse the army of men the soldiers opened fire. The men had little opportunity to fight back even though they had been armed for the assault was so sudden. This took place on January 1st and a week later it was thought by common agreement, the strikers went back to work without the expected advance in wages. It was reported that the mine owners will voluntarily increase the pay of their employees.

**Railways vs. Other Public Service Corporations.**

The present business situation throws into clear relief one important difference between railways and most other public service corporations. Street railways, waterworks, lighting concerns etc., feel more or less the effects of fluctuations in general business, but they did not suffer acutely from such changes because the number of people in a city does not decrease and the extent to which they are affected is not great. Water and light does not greatly diminish, even when industrial depression becomes pronounced. But railways bear such a relation to industrial and commercial enterprises of all kinds that every crop failure, every panic that shuts down factories and reduces the sales of wholesale merchants, reacts violently on traffic. The freight business of the railways of the United States has decreased enormously as compared with the corresponding period a year ago. The railway cannot, like the grocery store, reduce its operations in proportion to the decline in its business. To shut down entirely would be to sacrifice its franchise, and railroad commissions and the public protest violently against such a course. Service, especially passenger service, even when they are nowhere near in proportion to declines in earnings. Since railways are exposed to such violent fluctuations in business it is essential that in times of prosperity they should be permitted to earn much larger profits than most other concerns whose changes are subject to public regulation in order to make good the losses sustained in periods of depression. This consideration was advanced by transportation experts before almost every legislature and commission in the country last year as an argument against adjusting rates solely with regard to the traffic being handled at that time, but usually the argument was jauntily dismissed with the gratuitous assurance that the country's prosperity was established on such a firm foundation that nothing could happen that would hurt the railway. The fact is that the subsequent events show clearly why was right. It is to be hoped that the lesson will teach public authorities to adjust rates in future with more regard to actual conditions and with less regard to theories formulated with a cheerful ignorance of or contempt for facts and probable developments.—Railway Age February 14, 1908.
