burned and the occupants hanged. The vicinity where the outrages occurred contains about twenty negro farmers, who are tenants of wealthy residents of Poplar Bluff. They are peaceful, law-abiding,

thrifty, and prosperous, The white caps first visited the home of Nelson Simpson. He was called to the door and greeted with a shower of bullets. He fell mortally wounded. Other negro citizens were then visited, and after receiving harsh treatment were warned to leave.

OVERDRAFT DISAPPEARING.

Board of Works Affairs Well Managed in 1900.

\$70,000 ON GOOD ROADS.

The Actual Figures for the Year Reflect Great Credit on Ald. Findiay's Management - Overdraft in General Account Caused

by Increase of Laborers' Wages. Two most important documents were completed by City Engineer Wingate to-day, and are herewith submitted for the inspection of the people of Hamilton. They are the annual report of the Board of Works submitted for the inspection of the people of Hamilton. They are the annual report of the Board of Works department and the statement in detail of the work done and expenditure made under the Good Roads by-law. The more the figures are looked into the more the becomes apparent that, under the Chairmanship of Aid. Wm. Findlay, the affairs of the Board of Works department for 1900 were well and captully managed. There never was a year in the history of the city in which so much good work was done in the building of first-class permanent roads which are attracting the attention not only of all Canada and the United States, but of many municipalities in England. The tar-macadam roadways of Hamilton to-day are essentially Findlay roads, too. Then the city has been provided with first-class permanent sidewalks, and the general road work has been well kept up.

Of course all this costs money. It has been said that the Board of Works would have a big overdraft. At first \$20,000 was mentioned, then \$12,000 to \$15,000, but the complete figures show that the overdraft will be very small—less than \$9,000—against which is an item of \$2,500 for line costs and damages incurred in 1899.

Of the \$75,000 voted for permanent road work only \$70,000 has been fised. The expenditures, right up to the closs of the year, were—

Total This reduces, the actual \$6,638,98 ture on the year's work to \$58,349.-35, but still the Board has another large credit. In the item "Permanent Road Repairs, \$50,560.71" there are a number of works that must be paid for out of the permanent road fund. The total for these works is \$5,414.7, reducing the Board's expenditure to \$52,934.58. Then in the law costs and damages are items amounting to \$2,497.16, incurred by the Councils of 1898 and 1899, but paid this year, still further reducing the expenditure of the Board of 1900, to \$50,437.42. It must be remembered, too, that the year's estimate was based on a rate of wages of 15 cepts an hour, but that the actual rate for half the season was 18 cents an hour. This item alone made up more than the whole overdraft properly chargeable against the Board of the work done under the nor.

On the work done under the permanent road by-law, City Engineer Wingate figures that the increase of wages made a difference in the cost of \$10,000. His estimate for the work done was \$63,671.75 and the actual cost was \$63,071.20, not including a \$310 item for advertising, etc. Had he known of the increase of wages the estimate would have been \$75,000 at least.
