**PROVINCIAL FINANCES**  
The third report of provincial finances issued by the present government discloses a deficit on the year's operations of \$327,686.22. Added to the \$38,000 deficit of last year, this makes \$365,686.22 in two years. These deficits, with revenues the most buoyant in the history of the province, are matters of serious concern. They say plainly that we are living beyond our income, although that income is immensely greater than enjoyed by any previous government. They mean heavy additions to an interest account which is steadily climbing. For 1918 the interest demand was \$452,968.40, exclusive of the Valley Railroad guarantee. This year it is \$531,300.70, practically one fourth of the revenue from all sources, including the federal subsidy. The inability to make revenue and expenditure balance is attributed to the excessive cost for work done by the Forestry department and expenditure on roads and bridges in excess of expectations, heavy automobile traffic compelling unforeseen repairs to wooden bridges in many localities. If this year's deficit is funded there will be a corresponding interest increase for all time to come. If, on the other hand, it is carried forward to be recouped from this year's revenue, there must be heavier taxation and, be it remembered, the government is already tapping some sources of revenue which it should leave to the municipalities or share with them on a fair basis. There are the moving picture taxes, which aggregated \$2,000,000 every year collected in the larger communities, and there are the prohibition fines for which the municipalities have to pro-

vide all the court machinery. Neither of these sources of income should be tapped by the government, but should be left to the municipalities for their manifold needs under steadily growing cost. If the provincial situation is reviewed fairly and without political bias, the same conclusion must be reached as will be reached by an unbiased review of the St. John city situation. The effort is to do more than the wealth of the people justifies. Both the provincial and city governments are endeavoring to satisfy demands for improvements which can only be provided by imposing heavier burdens than a small, not wealthy and slow-growing population are warranted in assuming. Less haste in attaining metropolitan conditions is the remedy, but it is a remedy requiring greater moral courage than the average politician possesses or displays.
