The administration challenges the closest scrutiny, and is fully justified in claiming that at no time in the history of New Brunswick has her public business been more prudently and honestly conducted than by the present government. Mr. Mitchell was able to remark with pride and satisfaction on the stimulus the local government policy has given to the cheese and butter industry, as shown in the agricultural report for 1894. There are at present no less than twenty-seven cheese factories in the province, where in 1891 there were only eight. In 1891 there was but one creamery; now there seven combined butter and cheese factores, and four which make butter only, or in all forty-five butter and cheese factories as against eight in 1891. Surely this is progress and development for which the local government may claim a fair share of the credit. Does anybody suppose that these factories would be in operation today, but for the handsome bonuses extended to them by the local government? Yes, there is one person who pretends to speak for the farmers of this county who, ewhenver the dairy business is mentioned extends his neck and sneering declares it a "fad." Well, it is better to be called a

"fad" than a "freak." But what have been the results from the cheese and butter factories? In three years the number of patrons has increased from two hundred to twelve hundred, and the value of the product from \$18,000 to \$100,000. In 1891 the province imported a great deal of cheese and some butter, and exported neither butter nor cheese. The exports last year were \$2,000 worth of cheese and \$8,000 worth of butter. Ten cheese factories and five creameries were established last year in eight counties. Even the Sun, which is a bitter opposition organ, is compelled to admit that the growth of the co-operative cheese and butter industry is a matter which is a subject of congratulation to all who have had anything worth while to do with it, and that the provincial bonuses have given the business the stimulus it re-
