The British Government is buying three thousand more tons of Canadian hay.

Col. Sam. Hughes has been given a position in Lord Strathcona's Horse. So it is reported.

Dr. Conan Doyle, the famous novelist has offered his services as a surgeon for South Africa. He has been accepted.

The Laureatians with D and E Batteries of the second contingent passed St. Vincent, Cape Verde Islands on Wednesday last. The captain signalled "all well."

The Boston Globe reports that Stephen Arsenault, of Egmont Bay, P. E. I., a ship carpenter, was killed as the result of a fall at Bath, Maine, on Thursday last.

A horse started for West River on Friday last without a driver, and when near the West River landing, broke through the ice. Before any one reached the spot the animal was drowned.

Thieves entered the granary of Mr. Nelson, Bedouque, on the night of Jan. 30th and carried off five bags of flour. The granary of Mr. Bertram Cole was also entered and some tools were stolen.

Mr. Joseph Steele, of Souris, on Friday had his hand badly cut by a saw in Mr. J. McEneaney's saw and door factory. Mr. John Ryan also lost a finger in the same factory about a week before this.

While Mr. James McCallum of Lot 48, was crossing the river to Charlottetown on Saturday, his horse with a load of wheat broke through the ice. The horse was saved with great difficulty but the wheat and wheat went to the bottom.

The report that Private J. W. Jones the first Canadian contingent was killed in an engagement turned out to be true. He was killed in the action at Sunnyside on Jan. 1st when a colonial force under Col. Picher defeated a Boer commando at Sunnyside capturing their leader and forty prisoners. His death marks the first sacrifice of life by the Canadian volunteers.

According to advices from Honolulu, in an effort to stamp out the plague, it was decided to burn one of the blocks in Chinatown. The fire was started, and it gained such headway that the fire department could not control it. As a result of the destruction of the Chinese quarters, six or seven thousand people were rendered homeless, and they are now living in tents.

An "at home" under the auspices of Branch 281, English, was held on Wednesday evening, the 24th ult.
