VERY LATEST

BRITISH SMASH SUPREME EFFORT OF GERMANS.

LONDON To-day.
A Daily Mail correspondent in Northern France writing under date of Friday says: The big contest for Ypres which raged all last Sunday, culminated on Monday afternoon in a supreme effort. The Germans advanced all along the line cannonading the British positions, but the entrenched British soldiers had not been shaken. As the German infantry approached they met them with volley after volley of rifle fire. The Germans staggered forward falling by dozens under a withering hail of bullets. They held on bravely for 90 minutes, determined to win through, if at all possible. Then finding all attempts vain they withdrew under cover of darkness, leaving thousands of their wounded behind on the field. Railway communication with Lille has not been re-established. The Germans evacuated the city five days ago. Wells and cisterns were full of dead and there was not a drop of water fit to drink. Rigorous sanitation will proceed the granting of permission to the inhabitants to return to their homes.

H.M.S. GLASGOW AT PUERTO MONTE.

LONDON To-day.
A despatch to the Central News from Lima, Peru, says the British cruiser Glasgow, which was in the battle with Germans off Coronel, Chili, last Sunday, has arrived at Puerto Monte, Chili.

CAPTURE OF TSING TAU.

TOKIO To-day.
The capture of Tsing Tau loses to Germany her last foot of possessions on the Asiatic mainland, as well as her last strategic position outside of the German Empire in Europe. For nearly three months the German garrison of 7,000 has held out against the land and sea attacks of the Japs and of certain British detachments of both White and Indian troops that found themselves in China, at the outbreak of the war. What the losses of the garrison have been are not known but official Japanese and British reports have indicated that Tsing Tau has been taken at a heavy cost of men on the part of the Allies.

KAISER IN FLANDERS.

LONDON To-day.

A correspondent to the Express on the Belgian front under date of Friday telegraphs the following: The Kaiser himself is close to the front in Flanders, making efforts to inspire his troops to gain Calais. A party of refugees saw the Kaiser in an auto yesterday. One of them said the Kaiser sat on the rear seat with the Duke of Wurtemberg, the front seat being occupied by Infantry men, while a pilot car filled with soldiers went in front. The Kaiser's extreme pallor and rigidity of features were very marked. He sat like a statue wrapped in a grey coat and listened to the report of a passing officer. At the end he saluted but without a smile and then nodded silently to the soldier chauffeur to go ahead quick.

The Pay of the Dependents.

As we pointed out yesterday, the pay to be allowed to the dependents of our soldiers has not reached the dependents since the Florizel left. The trouble is that the allotment papers, authorizing the payments, were not signed by the soldiers before they left, and they have not yet been received, although several mails have come here since the Florizel arrived in England. When it was found that these allotment papers did not arrive by the mail on Thursday, the Hon. P. T. McGrath, Secretary, Mr. J. S. Munn, Treasurer, and Mr. Montgomery, members of the Finance Committee of the Patriotic Association met immediately to see what could be done for the women and children who were looking for the money. They approached the Governor and requested him to cable about them. In reply, His Excellency was informed that the allotment papers were dis-

patched from the camp at Salisbury Plain on Tuesday last. Some time must therefore elapse before the papers will arrive here. The Committee then resolved to do something immediately, and they are now taking down the claims of dependents, and on the strength of these claims, pending the arrival of the papers, payments will begin to be made on Monday. The delay of a fortnight, after arrival in despatching the papers, seems much of a piece with the lack of arrangement for signing them before the Florizel left on the voyage over. It is not calculated to inspire confidence in the management of the Paymaster's department.

No Room for Doubt.

Our morning contemporary is sceptical about the statement that Captain Timewell receives a Captain's pay and \$5.00 a day extra, despite the assertion, we decline to believe it. Such a thing would be too silly. There can be no conceivable reason for it, not even the shallowest reason of all,—expediency. If it is necessary to have a paid paymaster in the Old Country—and we doubt it—he should be either the adjutant of the regiment, at the regular rate of pay, or else an unadorned civilian. Captain Timewell, it appears, is not going to the front. Then, why in the world could not one of our Volunteers, who were rejected on health grounds, have taken the position, if such was necessary? Why, indeed, should a cent of salary have been required?
We, like him, had our doubts, and we wrote not a word about the matter, as we wished to avoid embarrassing the Government in reference to the Patriotic movement, until we had obtained proof that was incontrovertible. The facts are, Captain Timewell received \$2.75 a day as Paymaster up to the time he left. On the eve of his de-

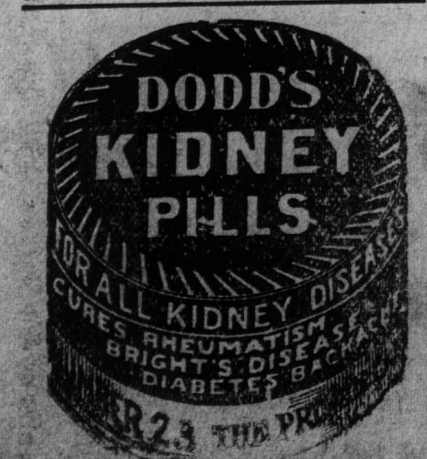
parture, the Governor-in-Council being so impressed with the importance of his office and the fact that Captain Timewell would not "mess" with the regiment, authorized the extra payment. As a matter of fact, the Government authorized more than we mentioned yesterday, for they authorized the payment of travelling expenses, which we did not mention. The Minute of Council authorizes payment to Captain Timewell of
(1) Captain's pay,
(2) Five Dollars a day extra,
(3) Travelling expenses which he may incur in connection with his work.
These three statements are founded on facts which we have verified.
