**Dame Fortune is Kind
to Frank Moran.**

Pittsburg Fighter Has Found Some Pretty Soft Spots.—Little Over a Year Ago He Was Broke.

Philadelphia, June 10.—There is an old saying to the effect that "Dame Fortune knocks once at every man's door." Johnny Eckhart, the veteran referee and handler of boxers, seems to think that the fair maiden knocked pretty loudly when she visited the domicile of Frank Moran, the red-haired heavyweight from Pittsburg, who stands as the only rival of Champion Jess Willard. Eckhart was talking of the good fortune of Moran the other day and he recalled an instance in the life of the big Pittsburger which shows how rapidly things change in the life of a modern pugilist.

Eckhart says that about a year ago Moran and his trainer and sparring partner, Willie Lewis, were in New York, flat broke. They had not eaten anything that day, and neither had the price of a cup of coffee, having recently returned from a disastrous trip to Europe. They were not so bad off for clothes, each having a good suit, but the pockets were empty and the outlook was bleak. They wandered along Broadway, Lewis hoping to meet some old "pal" from whom he could borrow a couple of dollars with which to eat. Lewis remembered a young stock broker who was fond of boxing and boxers, and he thought he might be made the victim of a "con" for perhaps a \$10 bill. He was afraid to tackle the job himself and mentioned the man to Moran.

Frank, who is a good talker, and not a bad-looking fellow, consented with the feeling of "Nothing ventured, nothing gained." He thought he might as well be "hung for a cow as for a sheep," and decided to borrow \$100 if possible; and he succeeded. Soon after the Coffee match was arranged and Moran earned \$6,000, and cleared off all his debts. The second Coffee fight yielded him \$9,000. The

Willard fight, \$22,000. Theatrical engagements netted \$2,800, and now he has an offer of \$20,000 to fight Jack Dillon, and has accepted, and there is every prospect of the match going through, for several promoters are bidding for it. When Moran gets that money, which he will get, win or lose, he will have earned over \$60,000, and he is the same Frank Moran who with his "pal," Willie Lewis, a little over a year ago did not have the price of a meal.

**Memorial Service for
Lord Kitchener.**

A Vast Crowd in St. Paul's Cathedral, Including the King, Queen and the Dowager Queen Alexandra.

London, June 13.—Great crowds lined the streets to-day in the vicinity of St. Paul's Cathedral and stood for hours in the rain, awaiting the arrival of King George, Queen Mary and Dowager Queen Alexandra for the memorial services for Field Marshal Earl Kitchener.

The doors of the Cathedral opened shortly after 10 o'clock and the vast building was rapidly filled with people who were fortunate enough to have tickets. Thousands of applicants for admission have been refused and it was stated that a building three times the size of St. Paul's would not hold the army officers who wished to attend the services. It was announced that the service would be practically divested of any military ceremonial. No troops lined the streets through which the royal party was to pass and there was no guard of honor.

A feature of the service was the part taken by the band of the Royal Engineers and the drummers of the Irish Guard, of which corps Lord Kitchener was honorary colonel.

The "Dead March" was played by the band and the drummers, and after the benediction the guardsmen were scheduled to sound the "last post."

In addition to the service in St. Paul's the memory of the dead soldier was honored by a ceremony in Westminster Abbey, while a third service was held in Canterbury Cathedral.

**Splendid Work Russian
Artillery.**

German-Constructed Field Fortresses of Steel and Concrete, Supposed Impregnable, Taken by Assault.

London, June 13.—All the special dispatches from Petrograd remark on the fine work of the Russian artillery, to which the recent swift advance is mainly attributed. They contend that the Russian advance proves that the German-constructed field fortresses of steel and concrete, which were supposed to be impregnable, can be taken by assault, despite all the latest scientific devices. The incomparable Russian guns and mining, says one correspondent, made short work of five-fold fortified lines.

It is reported that in some places where the Austrian preparations were most elaborate, the Russians captured twelve lines of entrenchments in rapid succession, while armored motor cars supplement the cavalry in pursuit of the retreating forces. The pursuit was facilitated by the excellence of the roads which the Austrians had constructed for their own transports.

Northwest of Tarnopol the Russians employed gas reservoirs captured from the Austrians, overwhelming the enemy with his own poisonous fumes.

Lutsk was surrounded by nineteen rows of entanglements when the Russians received the order to storm the place at dawn on Wednesday. The issue hung in the balance until noon, then a breach was made in the Austrian position. The town of Imbrosay the dispatches, was almost demolished by the Russian artillery fire which preceded its occupation.
