SERBIANS WIN NEW SUCCESS.

PARIS, Oct. 24.

Serbian troops operating in the Cerma region on the Macedonian front have won a new success, according to to-day's announcement by the war office. A counter attack launched by the German and Bulgarian troops was stopped by the Serbian artillery. The Serbians then attacked the opposing lines and captured several trenches.
