**Canadian Government
Puts Through Budget.**

Forty Million Dollars Taken off S. U. Pay Rolls—River Rising Causes Loss of Three Hundred Lives—Bolivia May Have Revolution—Slayer of Gertrude Yates Reprieved.

OTHER FORTY MILLION LOPPED OFF.

CHICAGO, June 13. The majority panel of the Railway Labor Board yesterday topped off \$40,000,000 from the pay of 350,000 men, or all the railwaymen affected by previous cuts except telegraphers and train service men. Deductions totalling \$110,000,000 in railroad wages effective July 1, have been announced.

KING HAS CLOSE SHAVE.

OTTAWA, June 13. By a majority of eighteen the Government at 1.30 this morning carried budget proposals. The vote was 161. Nine Progressives and one Independent voted with the Government. The Conservative amendment defeated 169 to 51.

EMIGRATION SCHEME.

LONDON, June 13. Mr. L. C. Amery, Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Admiralty, yesterday announced that since the Empire Settlement Act was passed the Government had entered into negotiations with the Commonwealth of Australia for the adoption

of a scheme for assisted passages for emigrants, the two governments paying one-third the transportation and advancing a loan of the other two-thirds. The Imperial Government, he said, was negotiating with the state of Western Australia, to co-operate in the scheme for helping emigrants after arrival, the Western Australian Government undertaking to find work for 7,500 new settlers. The scheme contemplates the placing of a suitable portion of the 7,500 men on farms to become their own in due time.

300 DROWNED.

SAN SALVADOR, June 13. Three hundred persons are known to have been drowned and many missing following an abnormal rise in the Acapulco and Arriaga Rivers which overflowed their banks and joined in one stream founding the Candelaria district of the city.

PROTEST AGAINST INTIMIDATION.

DUBLIN, June 13. The National Executive of the Farmers' Union at a meeting adopted a resolution protesting strongly against intimidation against candidates contesting Irish elections in the

WILLIAM'S BOOK.

BERLIN, June 13. The world rights, both book and serial, of the former German Emperor's memoirs have been secured by a United States syndicate for approximately a quarter million dollars. McClure's Syndicate controls the serial rights which have already been bought by a score of United States papers, according to the statement of Clinton T. Brainerd, President of the McClure Newspaper Syndicate. The book contains 30,000 words. Chapter readings include Bismarck, Caprivi, Hohenlohe, Von Eulow, Bethmann, Hollweg, my assistants and our successors, my relations with religious demonstrations, army, and navy, hope and peace, end of war, up to bar of a neutral tribunal, the question of guilt, revolution and the future of Germany.

SALVATION ARMY PLANS.

MONTREAL, June 13. The Salvation Army has formulated a plan to bring over 17,000 women, youths and children to Canada from the British Isles. The proposal

includes the transfer of approximately 10,000 women for domestic work, thirty to fifty per cent. of whom could be placed in country smaller towns will be brought over to the number of about 2500. The third class consists of boys around fifteen years. Executives of the Salvation Army in Montreal state that only the best elements of British citizenship would be selected. The work of transporting will extend over the next five or six years.

POLITICAL TURMOIL IN BOLIVIA.

BUENOS AIRES, June 13. A state of siege has been declared at La Paz and Oruro, Bolivia, according to advices received by the Foreign Office from the Argentine Legation at La Paz. The proclamation is attributed to disturbed political conditions in Bolivia.

CHURCHILL EXPLAINS.

LONDON, June 13. Members of the Irish Provisional Parliament which has been summoned for July 1, will not be required to take the oath prescribed by the treaty, Winston Spencer Churchill, Secretary of State for the Colonies, announced in the Commons this afternoon, although the Ministers of the Provisional Government will be required to do so under the terms of the treaty. As for the members of Parliament of the Free State it is explained they would have to take the oath.

TRUE'S REPRIEVE.

LONDON, June 13. Concerning the reprieve of Major Ronald True, convicted slayer of Gertrude Yates, Home Secretary Short in an interview said the law required him to reprieve convicted murderers shown to be insane, and that he knew nothing of True's relatives. Statements were made that True was reprieved because he was the son of a woman of the peerage.

WHY THE LOAN FAILED.

PARIS, June 13. The International Bankers Committee which has adjourned without agreeing on a loan to Germany considered three plans, according to Echo De Paris, Germany wanted a loan of four billion gold marks under her plan of which she was to take 1,300,000,000 marks, dividing the remainder with the Allies. The Belgian plan provided that Germany borrow during the current year from international money lenders 1,200,000,000 marks, just enough to meet Belgium's claims under her priority privilege. The French plan proposed to divide the 12,000,000,000 gold marks due from Germany into two parts and issue bonds in instalments spread over a number of years.
