Obituary

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—Please allow me space in
your paper to report the death of
William Diamond of Glovertown, B.B.,
who passed suddenly away on the
night of the 24th of August at Indian
Hr., Labrador.

Mr. Diamond came from Catalina as
a young married man and settled at
Glovertown where he made his home
and brought up his family. He was a
fisherman from his earliest days, and
continued right up till this present
summer. He was nearly 71 years old
and though very, very crippled, he
still felt inclined to go along with his
son another summer. Several times
during the summer he showed signs
of not feeling well, though apparently
nothing to worry over, and on the
evening of the 24th of August, he re-
turned to his berth to arise no more in
this life. He retired with the intention
going out fishing in the morning
and his son, knowing this, gave him a
pill, but his lifeless form could not
respond. The Angel of Death had
silently come in the still watches of
the night and bore away the precious
spirit, leaving only the cold tenement
of clay, which was prepared as well
as possible and brought home for
burial. The blow came hard to the
bereaved ones at home, as well as the
sorrowing son on board, but we be-
lieve that our loss is Heaven's gain
and that by and bye, we shall meet
where there will be no more parting.
His precious remains reached home on
the 14th of September, and was laid to
rest on the 16th by the side of the lit-
tle church he loved so well and right
in front of his own home window. The
funeral service was conducted by Rev.
Williams and Rev. Turtle. Friends
came from far and near to pay their
last respects to a beloved brother
and friend. He leaves to mourn their
sad loss, a wife, one son, four daugh-
ters and 25 grand children.

weeks the street line has been altered
on LeMarchant Road west by the
removal of a private boundary fence

was done by the Council to compen-
sate the owner of the land for a nar-
row strip taken on the north side of
the street. It was also done in spite of
the fact that the northern property
was considerably improved by the re-
moval of the hovels and the new street
line. As the owner demanded com-
pensation this should have been paid
in cash and the southern boundary
left in conformity with the rest of
the street. As it is at present it re-
presents an eyesore on the finest
thoroughfare in the city. The Council
is condemned for arranging such an
atrocious settlement and should re-
consider this matter before this sec-
tion of the road is permanently spoilt.
Trusting this will be given the
consideration it deserves.

"In Fast Company" at the Majestic

Something of the speedy action in

"The Rag Man."

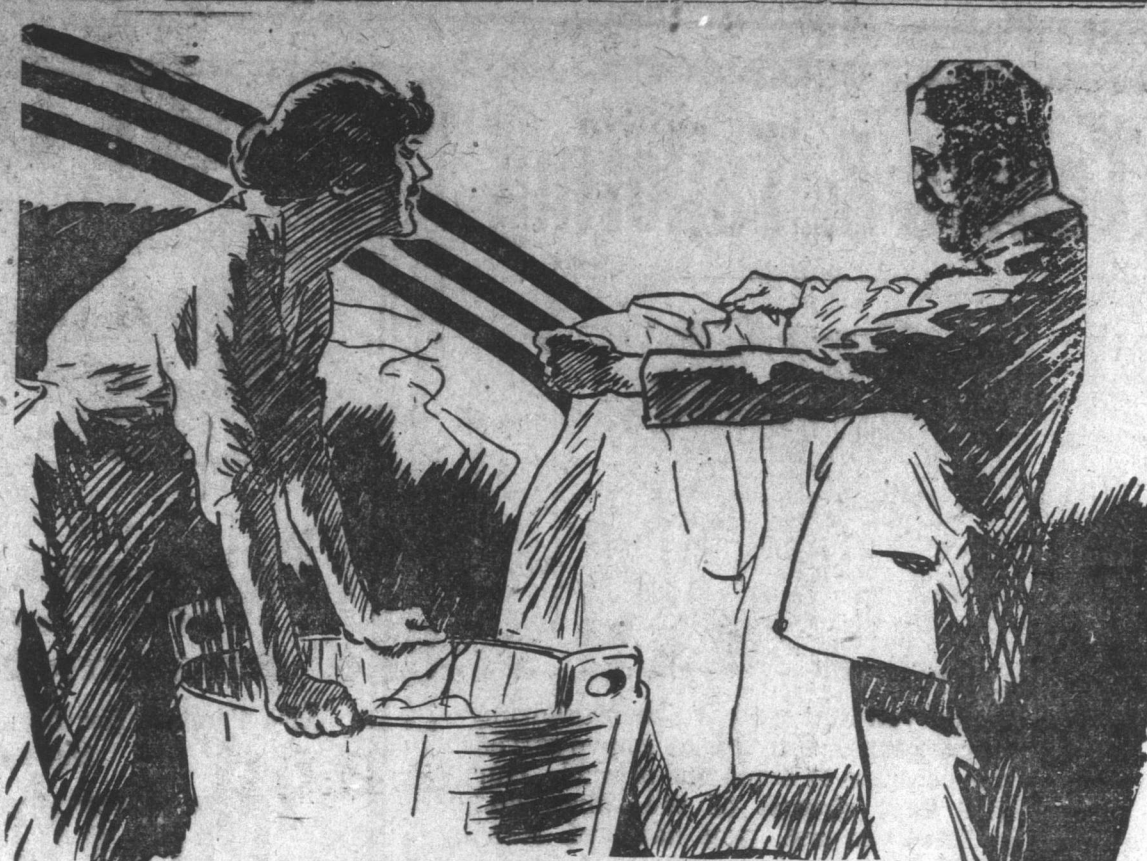
For his fourth picture on his Metro-
