SAVE THE CORN FOR HUMAN FOOD

Owing to the extreme gravity of the situation as regards a probable food shortage in the belligerent countries on account of the war, the conservation and planting of food crops is strongly urged. In the States the attention of the Federal Government has been drawn to the extraordinary advantages of Cotton Seed Meal as feed for farm animals.

Four lbs. of corn at \$1.50 per bushel costs 11 cents. Two lbs. of cottonseed meal at \$40 per ton costs 4 cents. The feeder would thus save 7 cents per day on each head of stock, or a saving of \$14 per mule in a period of 200 days."

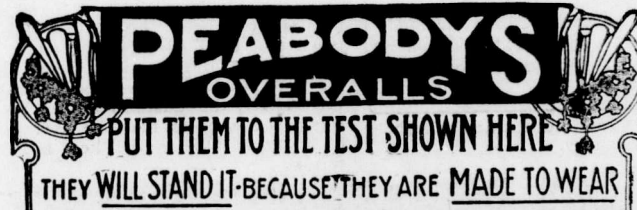
