SHOWERS, MOSTLY FINE AND WARM.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 16—11 p.m.—In Eastern Canada there has been little change since yesterday, the pressure continuing high to northward of the Gulf and low south of Nova Scotia, with generally unsettled weather and cool northerly winds. A small area of depression has moved to the lake region from the southwest, bringing showery weather. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Equinault, 46°—68°; Edmonton, 49°—68°; Calgary, 44°—64°; Prince Albert, 38°—64°; Quappelle, 48°—64°; Winnipeg, 48°—68°; Toronto, 54°—78°; Montreal, 58°—72°; Quebec, 54°—64°; Halifax, 56°—70°.

Sheriff of Middlesex.

Mr. D. M. Cameron, ex-M. P., of Strathroy, has been appointed sheriff of Middlesex in succession to the late Sheriff Glass.

Mr. Donald Mackenzie Cameron was born in Dingwall, Scotland, Nov. 11, 1843. He was educated at the George Heriot school, Edinburgh, and at the London (Ont.) public school, having come to this country in 1859. In 1879 he married Victoria Wilson, youngest daughter of the late Wm. Good-

hum, of Toronto. He was a journalist for some years and served upon the staff of the London (Ont.) Prototype, and of the Toronto Globe. For some years past Mr. Cameron has been a merchant. He has been deputy reeve and reeve of Strathroy, warden of the county of Middlesex in 1883, and a trustee of the Strathroy high school board. He was first returned to Parliament as member for the Liberal members for West Middlesex, Mr. G. W. Ross, the sitting member being unseated. He was defeated in the election of 1887 by Dr. Roome.

In the City Police Court.

An alleged child-bugging episode occupied the attention of Magistrate Parke in the Police Court yesterday. Herbert Swazie was the defendant. Elizabeth Slade, the complainant, in her evidence said that he had taken her boy in his arms, carried the child into the street, and there kicked him severely. These allegations Swazie absolutely denied. The magistrate thought that both parties should try to get along in neighborly amity, and adjourned the case for two weeks to await developments.

Benjamin Harris, whom it appears, occupied a portion of a street which he had been ordered to vacate. He will be given until Tuesday to remove the obstructions.

Thomas Burke, who was arrested by Detective Nichol on a charge of vagrancy, was remanded until Tuesday. His antecedents will be investigated.

Men and Women Bicyclists.

Wives and Daughters remarks: "A physician says women, as a rule, on the bicycle are graceful, dignified, self-reliant, and in the majority of instances, look like agitated grasshoppers. They sprawl over their wheels, sit with their spinal columns almost in a half circle and act as though it were necessary to work for dear life in order to get ahead." We had noticed how much more gracefully women ride, but out of regard to the feelings of gentlemen bicyclists of our acquaintance, refrained from commenting on the fact until now. Truth, however, like murder, will out. Mrs. Denner, in "Felix Holt," you remember, had very decided notions about the general deficiencies of the women; "It mayn't be good luck to be a woman," said Mrs. Denner, "but one begins with it from a baby; one gets used to it. And I shouldn't like to be a man, to cough so loud, and stand straddling about on a wet day, and be so wasteful with must and other sex. They're a coarse lot, I think. Mrs. Denner is rather hard on our gentlemen friends, many of whom, indeed, in their own sphere, show to advantage even in comparison with women—but not on bicycles."

World's Fair Cattle Here.

The cattle and horses from Ontario destined for exhibition at the Columbian Exhibition mustered here yesterday, and proceeded to Chicago last night. The cattle, numbering some 100, in all, go by way of the Grand Trunk and the tunnel, while the horses go by the C. P. R. At noon to-day everything was in readiness for the journey, and the trains waiting for the arrival of one carload from Mr. Edwards, M. P., Rocklands, in the Ottawa Valley. The exhibitors for the most part accompany their stock, and the cars are all decorated with flags and bunting. The principal exhibitors are: W. B. Coburn, Aberley; W. C. Edwards, Ottawa; G. & W. Russell, Richmond Hill; T. L. Nicholson, Sylvest; Morgan & Son, Kerwood; Mr. Sanders, St. Thomas; Mr. Fleming, Toronto; Wm. Cahoon, Owen Sound; Mr. Cockburn, Aberley; W. J. Reid, Eden Mills; Thomas Grey, Oshawa; Mr. Stewart, Belleville; Mr. Smith, Oxford; Mr. Neely, Simcoe. Henry W. Lee, Toronto, is in the city in the interest of the exhibit, and Joseph Barnett, of the Guelph Agricultural College, accompanies the train. A wait will be made at Sarnia for inspection, and Chicago will probably be made late Thursday night.

Important to Dairymen.

The following circular has been sent to the cheesemakers in Western Ontario:

Dear Sir: I have been instructed by the executive committee of the Dairyman's Association of Western Ontario to invite you to co-operate with the association and the Dominion dairy commissioner to secure a thorough representative exhibit of cheese from Western Ontario at the World's Fair at Chicago in the competition in October.

Definite and particular information in reference to the different classes and the arrangements which have been made for receiving and transporting the exhibits may be found on pages 5 to 8 of the enclosed bulletin issued by the dairy commissioner.

"The cheese from every factory which will merit the highest number of points when judged in October—no matter in what month they were made—are wanted. Probably the best selected from the last half of August or the first ten days of September will be best." Particular attention should be given to the quality, general appearance and boxing of the cheese. Be careful to have the cheese perfect in flavor and finished without any blemishes in appearance from handling or pressing. Put them only in strong, well-made boxes with covers that will stay on securely without rattling. If the boxes are used let them be short so that they will not detract the cheese through the box.

The executive committee of the association have made arrangements for expert judges to visit the factories as far as possible and select the cheese to be sent to Ingross for shipment from there to Chicago.
