DETAILED STORY OF YALU BATTLE

Japs Swept Onward in Face of Withering Fire.

HIT BY THEIR OWN SHELLS

With Cheers and Flags Flying Japs Stormed the Heights Held by the Russians.

Wiju, May 1, via Seoul, May 8. — When the early mist drifted from the Yalu River this morning the Japanese infantry was disclosed lined up for battle on the low, sandy island of the river, which is in front of Wiju. The walls and towers of the city on the hill, rising abruptly from the south bank of the river, were crowded with Japanese and Korean spectators of the forthcoming attack. Kinteto Inlet is hardly anything but a narrow channel, and the river, it is a low, sandy plain, only a few feet above the level of the water, and without shrubbery or cover except on its sandy banks. The Japanese lay with stacked arms across the island. The soldiers were spread out in line three miles long. The division of the Imperial Guards occupied the center of the line; another division was on the west, and a third on the east of the line. The Russian batteries were behind the infantry on its extreme flanks, concealed by the shrubbery. Two batteries began the action by throwing shells to the Manchurian side of the river for half an hour, while the sun was rising. They sprinkled with shells the embankments whence the Russian guns had been firing for the past week, but no response to their fire was forthcoming, and it looked as if the Russian had removed their batteries during the night.

Soon after 7 o'clock the Japanese began to advance. This distance from the Korean to the Manchurian bank of the Yalu is about two miles. The Japanese troops spread out in extended formation as they went forward. When they were a few hundred yards from the hills on the Manchurian side they threw themselves over the ground and began volleys. The Japanese batteries searched the hills with shrapnel. The Russians could now be seen at intervals where the road was exposed, hurrying in small squads along the hills. These exposed stretches of the road were fine targets for the Japanese gunners. A fierce fire was concentrated on one open space, half the shrapnel thrown bursting over a small group of men, and the observers could see the work of an occasional shell as it dug a great hole in the earth and scattered quantities of rock.

Still the Russians remained silent. There was no answering fire from them until the first Japanese line was within a few hundred yards of the river bank. Then sharp volleys burst almost simultaneously from several trenches, and the attacking Japanese found themselves under a heavy and continuous fire at easy range from covered positions high above them. They lay behind the sand hillocks, replying bravely to the Russian fire, while their own batteries pumped shells over their heads. The Japanese officers sat on their horses or walked along the lines, but there was no way sheltered nor protected. A few stretcher-bearers coming back to the field hospital indicated that the Russians were being wounded. The Russian smokeless powder was excellent. Its use made it impossible for the Japanese to discover the position of the enemy or to estimate their numbers.

Soon after 8 o'clock the Russian fire was largely silenced by the combined artillery and infantry attack of the Japanese, and parties of the enemy's troops could be seen hurrying upward over the mountain range in the distance. Two regiments of Japanese troops, one directly opposite Wiju, and another near a village on the west, ran to the river, stopping to rest on the way as they progressed and giving shrill cheers as they hurried forward, which echoed clear over the plain. Their formation was closer than that kept by British or American troops, and it looked as though their losses must be great. They were in the lead, and across the sands and climbed up to the steep, rocky hillsides like a swarm of ants, their red and yellow cap bands gleaming in the sun.

One Japanese soldier in one of the regiments carried something white with him. This was the cause of a shout to go up that the Russians had surrendered. But upon reaching the top of the first Russian trench, 100 yards or so, the Japanese were shocked out a Japanese flag and waved it to and fro.

of the advance mounted a hill commanding the Russian retreat. Just as the men were bunched thickly on the crest of this hill, two Japanese shells burst among them. They had fallen short. When the smoke had cleared away a dozen bodies could be seen lying where the shells had exploded, and the remainder of the storming party were clambering down the hill to escape this unexpected fire from their rear.

The sound of the rifle firing soon passed over the hills as the Japanese pursued the retreating enemy.

SANITARIUM IN ARCTIC

It's in Lapland and Operated for Cure of Tuberculosis.

Stockholm, Sweden, May 9. — The learned doctors of medicine have established the fact that the open-air treatment for tuberculosis is the most effective; that plenty of fresh air, plenty of exercise, plenty of the lungs and other pulmonary diseases. So sanitariums have been established in higher and higher altitudes.

It remains to set up one almost in the arctic region, and now that has been done at Wessavigne, Lapland, a little "house on the shore" of Lake Torne, in a most picturesque but most isolated region. Only a few Lapps, who are the only natives, are seen from time to time at Wessavigne.

The railway connecting the village with Norway and Sweden runs through a very desolate country, and that for 124 miles on its line there is not one depot.

It is planned to build near this most northerly sanitarium a small station for the study of biology and physics. The flora and fauna of the section could be studied there, as well as the meteorological and electrical phenomena. So it is probable that the resort of invalids, but of savants.

LION SPRANG AT CIRCUS AUDIENCE

King of Beasts Brushed Past Terrified People, But Did Not Taste Blood.

London, May 9. — A lion escaped, amid a scene of wild excitement, from a traveling menagerie in the little Devonshire town of Dawlish Saturday night.

During the previous night's entertainment the lion tamer, named Cooper, was slightly injured, and for this occasion a substitute was found, who, on entering the cage, failed, apparently, to secure the door properly. Without suspecting that anything was wrong, the audience thoroughly enjoyed the feats the two African lions were made to perform.

Without a second's warning, Nero, the larger of the lions, forced open the door of the cage, and fell heavily against one of the attendants. For a moment the lions stood face to face with the audience. He growled, and then sprang from the platform on which the cage was fixed into the midst of the people. A fearful scene ensued. In the panic women swooned away, the children screamed, and many people were injured in the rush that was made for the exits.

The tamer quickly got out of the cage, and this time he saw that the door was safely closed on the other side, which, missing its mate, and surveying the struggling mob, set to increase the din by dashing itself against the bars and by roaring defiantly.

Probably among all the terrified crowd it was more frightened than the escaping king of beasts himself. Actually brushing past many of the terror-stricken people, he reached one of the exits before any of them, and was gone ere the first shrieks had ceased.

Dashing through a door in the tent, the lion fled across an adjoining field, and thence made his way into a neighboring plantation, where, somewhat calmer, he was subsequently secured with ropes by a band of men and led back to the menagerie without either having tasted blood or suffered in the encounter.

The booth was cleared in a few moments, mainly owing to the presence of mind of someone who pulled away the lower portion, making a huge gap, through which the frightened people stampeded.

POSED AS GRAND DUKE

Young Belgian With Plenty of Nerve Tries To Hold Up London.

London, May 9.—The city of London has had scores of men who have posed as members of royal houses of Europe, but none has shown such striking and ineffable gall as Jacques Roos, aged 19, of Antwerp, and Meyer Bengier, aged 50, of Rotterdam. Both have been arrested, the former having impersonated the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, and the latter as his aide-de-camp.

On Tuesday the men called at the shop of the Goldsmiths and Silversmiths' Company and asked for some jewelry to be sent to the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin at the Carlton Hotel. The order was not executed, but the secretary of the company went to the hotel the next day and there saw the accused. Roos said he was the duke, and the secretary told him that the jewelry would be brought by an assistant who spoke French.

The "assistant" arrived in the person of a detective.

"Are you the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin?" he asked the younger man, and Roos answered "Yes." The detective told the prisoner who he was, and Roos repeated that he was the grand duke, adding that his companion's name was Hertzburger, and that he was "attached to him."

Thereupon the detective read a paragraph from a newspaper announcing that the grand duke was to be married on the continent and that the queen was to be present.

Several cards bearing the name, "Grand Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, on which were the words, "Hertzburger, aide-de-camp," were found. The detective inquired in their possession. Their luggage consisted of two handbags.

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Smoked in Bed.
