FOR A COLONY OF CLIFF DWELLERS

Arizona Promoter Looking Up
Recruits in Canada—Get
"Near to Nature."

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 14.—A man representing himself as Rev. Emil H. Melspeth, of Kingman, Arizona, passed through Buffalo the other day, claiming that he made a tour of Canada in recruiting settlers to found a village in the Oskati Mountains in Arizona. The Oskati range is about 25 miles east of Kingman, and is believed to have been inhabited by a prehistoric race of cliff-dwellers.

The Rev. Mr. Melspeth made the statement that he had enlisted about 1,500 families in the Dominion of Canada, who are willing to populate these ancestral homes. He says Arizona is a state with plenty of resources.

This man's idea is to have his people live in caves in this mountain range, going back to that mode of civilization which existed many years ago. The divine worship will be conducted in the open air at sunrise and sunset. There is to be no tobacco or liquor at this settlement.

Mr. Melspeth claims to have interested a number of wealthy philanthropists in his idea, and that they will furnish whatever pecuniary aid is necessary. The scheme is to have men in closer touch with nature, to make him forget the trials and tribulations of a bustling world, and to live a life of ease and devoted to worship. Many people took upon the proposition with interest, but it does not have a deterrent effect upon the Rev. Mr. Melspeth.

WORKMEN DECEIVED

A Sharper From England Operating
at Toronto.

Toronto, Dec. 14.—A number of men who replied to an advertisement promising steady work and good wages caused the arrest yesterday of Jas. Withers, an Englishman, new to this country, who had a room in a house at 119 Church street, which he used for an office. Nine men were told that if they deposited one dollar they would be given a trip to England with cattle by way of Buffalo, and 25 have filed their receipts with Inspector Archbold, of the morality department.

The police assert that fully 40 men who paid money this afternoon were told to come back at the end of the week to get their ocean passage and cash. Withers was placed in the cells after he failed to satisfy the inspector that he would fulfill his promises.

MILITIA COUNCIL FOR THE DOMINION

Its Membership and Scope Are
Defined—Duties of the
Members.

Ottawa, Dec. 14.—A lengthy militia order issued last evening outlines the formation of the militia council, stating its membership and scope, and providing for the publication of its deliberations.

The council is composed of the Minister of Militia, the chief of the general staff, the adjutant-general, the quartermaster-general, the master-general of ordnance as military member, the Deputy Minister of Militia as civil member, the chief accountant of the department as financial member and a secretary.

It is provided that the council shall meet once a fortnight of often, but no business is valid until sanctioned by the Minister of Militia, who is the only member directly responsible to the people.

The outline is given of the duties of the headquarters staff. The chief of the general staff shall be charged with advice on all questions of general military policy—the organization of the military forces for service, the collection of intelligence and general training and direction of the militia.

The adjutant-general has to raise the militia, maintain, maintain establishment of officers and men, distribute the units, promulgate orders and carry out all details under the chief officers.

The quartermaster-general has the organization of all transport, remount, supplies and baggage services, and general supervision of all supplies.

The master-general of the ordnance is charged with the armament of the forces, including wires, electric lights and all accessories. He has also to do with the construction of fortresses, barracks, etc., and the administration of the engineer staff.

The other members of the council—the deputy minister and finance member—have to do with the general clerical and administration work of the department.

The order-in-council defining these duties is dated Dec. 7, and it abrogates all previous orders.

BURNED IN HIS HOME

A Windsor Man Seriously Injured
—Blaze at Peterboro.

Windsor, Ont., Dec. 14.—Richard Green, a colored man, of this city, aged 70 years, was terribly burned at his home here. The old man was alone for his home at the time of the accident but managed to crawl to the door and attract the attention of neighbors. He lapsed into unconsciousness, and has been delirious ever since, so that the circumstances of the accident cannot be ascertained. Green may recover, although his entire right side is terribly burned.

Peterboro, Ont., Dec. 14.—B. Laster's drygoods store was badly gutted by fire yesterday. Mr. Laster tried to extinguish the flames with a blanket but was unsuccessful, and being overcome by the smoke, had his hair badly scorched. The damage will amount to nearly \$2,000; about covered by insurance.

IN NEW BRUNSWICK, TOO

By-Elections To Be Held on the
30th of December.

St. John, N. B., Dec. 13.—The Provincial Government is calling the bye-elections in St. John city and county. They will be held on Dec. 30, and only one day's notice for the St. John City convention has been given. A. O. Skinner, carpet merchant, is likely to be the Government candidate.

For the county seat the Government supporters nominated County Councillor James Lowell.

ELECTION ECHOES

Two Protests Filed—Preparing Writs
for Ontario Elections.

Toronto, Dec. 14.—Yesterday two protests were handed in at Osgoode Hall. In North Grey, John Agar appears as the petitioner against the election of William P. Telford (Liberal), making the usual charges. The second petition, Norfolk, is signed by H. B. Donly, protesting the election of Col. D. Tisdale (Conservative), against whom the usual charges are also made.

It is said that the Conservatives of Nova Scotia will file protests against the election of thirteen Liberal members.

Owen Sound, Dec. 14.—The North Grey election trial came to an end yesterday, after counsel had discussed for an hour the question whether the telegram which announced the dissolution of the Legislature was strict legal evidence. Their lordships decided that "Dissolution puts an end to the proceedings."

Toronto, Dec. 13.—Col. Clarke, the clerk of the Legislature, was busy yesterday getting ready for the issue of the writs for the elections. These will be issued on Dec. 29, elections taking place as announced on Jan. 25. All the Farmers' Institute meetings have been called off until after the elections.

NOMINATIONS.

Perlin, Ont., Dec. 14.—The Liberals of Perth Waterloo met in convention in Waterloo yesterday to select a candidate to contest the coming provincial elections. The unanimous choice was Mr. George Moore, egg merchant, of Waterloo.

Russell, Ont., Dec. 14.—At the county of Russell Conservative convention held here, James Rolston, merchant, of Metcalfe, was nominated as Conservative standard-bearer.

Oom Paul's Will.

London, Dec. 14.—A correspondent at Pretoria says that among the articles included in the movable property left by former President Kruger in Europe the following are enumerated for purposes of the will: One bottle of snuff, one tall silk hat, one black ear tube, various Psalm books, a large Bible, six smaller Bibles, eight button decorations, a purse containing one Transvaal sovereign and one Transvaal shilling, one straw hat, the Great Cross of the Netherlands, the German Red Eagle, the French Cross of the Legion of Honor, the Great Cross of Monaco and two envelopes containing hair and beard of the deceased. The fixed property of the deceased in Europe is returned as nil.

KING FOR GODFATHER

Arrangements for Christening Duke
of Manchester's Boy.

London, Dec. 14.—The baptism of the infant son of the Duke and Duchess of Manchester has been fixed definitely for Monday next at the chapel royal at St. James' Palace, when the King will be present and act as sponsor, along with Catherine, the Duchess of Westminster, and George Wyndham.

SPORTS EXHIBITION

Proposition to Hold International
Show at Paris.

Paris, Dec. 14.—The Government is considering the proposition of holding at Paris in 1907 an international sports exhibition, to be followed in 1908 by another devoted to industrial affairs and the laboring classes. This plan would replace that of holding the universal exposition in 1911, according to the custom of having an event of this kind every eleven years. The proposed sports exposition would naturally include much regarding automobiles and physical culture.

CARS PILED UP

Engineer and Fireman Killed—No
Passengers Seriously Hurt.

Wilmington, N. C., Dec. 14.—A south-bound Atlantic Coast Line passenger train from Rocky Mountain City to Wilmington, was wrecked yesterday by running into an open switch at Overman's siding, near Warsaw.

Engineer Guilford F. Horne and his fireman, Sterling Creech, were instantly killed.

None of the passengers were seriously injured, although the entire train except the locomotive and Pullman was piled up alongside the track.
