Londoner Was Robbed in Hamilton

Hamilton Herald: Mr. Arthur L. Garthwaite, of Heintzman & Co., formerly of London, the well-known singer, has been out of town for a few days, and his wife has been visiting at her former home in Port Huron. Last night Mr. Garthwaite returned home, and was advised by the police to look over his house, 118 Hunter street west. When he did so he discovered that all that was left of value was what couldn't be carried expeditiously and quickly through a window during the night. He immediately took an inventory to find out what was gone and then repaired to the city hall with the list. He was able to identify as his property every article that was found on Thomas Taaffe yesterday, at the cells, when that worthy was arrested for being drunk, and disgorged a bunch of stuff that would make any ordinary man tired to carry it a block. Taaffe was wearing two suits of clothes when arrested and one of these proved to be Mr. Garthwaite's. It consisted of a blue coat and trousers and a cardigan jacket. Other than the stuff mentioned Mr. Garthwaite suffered a serious loss that the police would like to recover, but which it is hardly likely they ever will. Mr. Garthwaite left \$250 in cash in the house, and when he examined the rest of the goods at the police office and the house he was unable to find his money. A grey check tweed suit and some towels were also among the still missing. Taaffe comes up in a few days and it is not altogether unlikely that some person else will stand beside him to answer to the charge, that is, if the police get a line on the \$250, which they do not think he could have got rid of in the short time since the robbery, which is thought to have taken place Wednesday night.

Real Estaters and the Treasurership

At a meeting of the London Real Estate Association held last evening, following a resolution was passed: "Resolved, That this association deems that the present is an opportune time to adopt common sense methods in regard to the treasurership of the city of London. It is a well-known fact that many industrial and financial institutions in this city involving the handling of twice and three times the amount passing through the city treasury do not pay half as much for the service as does the city of London. All our public service costs far too much, and now is the time to apply the pruning knife. Surely competent men with business methods could easily fill the position of treasurer or a city like London. One man does it for the county, where the assessment is nearly double."

A Record Trip on the Grand Trunk

Speaking of the trip of the Port Huron and Sarnia Knights Templar to Toronto, the Sarnia Observer says: The party, which numbered about 100, left here on a special G. T. R. train on Tuesday evening. By special request the engine crew and train crew were chosen from among the railway employees who are members of the Masonic craft, so that every one connected with the pilgrimage was a Masonic brother. Those in charge of the train were as follows: Conductor, Geo. Cully; Engineer, Alex. Bond; Fireman, John Owen; Brakeman, Robt. Simcock; Baggageman, Chas. Cooper. The train left here at 6:35 Tuesday evening, and barring a delay of fifty minutes at London an excellent run was made to Toronto, the arrival there being at 11:47. But it was on the return trip that the fast time was made. The special left Toronto at 8:40 p.m., and from the time that the engine wheels made their first revolution Engineer "Tim" Bond, as he is familiarly called, let her out and the knowing ones looked for a fast ride and they were not disappointed. Some idea of the speed attained by the train may be had when it is noted that on different sections of the road the train ran at the rate of over 70 miles an hour. This record-breaking speed was obtained between Toronto and Junction Cut between Woodstock and London, and between London

and Sarnia. The special consisted of liner engine 953, a baggage car and two first-class coaches.

On the trip to Toronto Assistant Superintendent A. J. Nixon, of London, was on board, and on the return trip Assistant Trainmaster Trussler accompanied the excursionists. Both of these officials, together with the train crew, were indefatigable in their efforts to provide every comfort for the members of the party. The Grand Trunk Railway Company should feel proud of having such painstaking and courteous gentlemen in their employ. The return trip from Toronto was one long "celebration," the Sir Knights and ladies vying with each other to provide amusement for the entertainment of all. Refreshments were served on the train both going and returning, and a general good time resulted.

At London the band paraded Richmond street, accompanied by the Sir Knights and the ladies and made the people of that city think that a contingent of the Old Boys and Girls had returned to town. Serenades were also indulged in at Strathroy and Wyandham, and when the train reached Sarnia the Port Huron party assembled on the tunnel depot platform and bade their Sarnia comrades goodbye. As the train started for Port Huron the Sarnia contingent gave three hearty cheers for their Port Huron friends, and this most pleasant pilgrimage was at an end.

City Clerk Baker's request that a new typewriter be purchased, was laid over, with the understanding that the chairman make a report at the next meeting as to the advisability of buying a second-hand typewriter from the defunct Empire Accident Insurance Company.
