GERMANY FACES
GIGANTIC LOCKOUT

The Building Trade May Be Completely Tied Up.

Berlin, April 4.—A gigantic lockout, initiated by 22,000 employers and involving direct or indirectly a million and a half workmen, appears to be inevitable in the German building trades. The lockout will probably begin on the 14th of this month. It means the culmination of a series of disputes between organized employers and organized workmen over wages, hours of labor and other mutual interests. The trade employers held a convention at Dresden recently and drafted a new code on conditions of labor, which they presented to the unions. A conference of delegates of all unions will be held in Berlin on Monday to consider the ultimatum submitted by the employers. The majority of the delegates have already been instructed by their unions to unconditionally reject the employers' terms. The employers, who have foreseen this rejection, decided to lock out all workmen who refuse to accept their terms after April 14. The number of workmen directly affected is 400,000, but the workmen of allied and dependent trades who will be thrown out of work by the lockout is estimated to number 1,000,000. In Berlin alone 25,000 men will be locked out and 100,000 others will be indirectly affected. The minister has been appealed to, and asked to use his influence to avert a gigantic industrial war, but the employers and the workmen say they will accept neither mediation nor compromise.

BROOKLYN BANK CLOSED

State Authorities Take Charge of Affairs of the Union Bank.

New York, April 5.—The doors of the Union Bank of Brooklyn were closed this morning. The bank has seven branches. O. L. Cheney, state superintendent of banks, has taken possession. The assets and liabilities of the bank have not been made known. Supt. Cheney has not yet decided whether the bank's difficulties had been caused by bad loans or indifferent investments. He said that later a statement would probably be forthcoming after a further examination of the bank's books had been made. The Union Bank took over the business of the Mechanics' and Traders' Bank of Manhattan, which closed over two years ago. The effect of the bank's predicament had only a negligible effect on the stock exchange, as the institution was not a member of the New York stock exchange. The president of the bank is Edward M. Grant, a former comptroller of the New York City Bank, which has a capitalization of \$10,000,000, with deposits of over \$5,000,000.

A LOVERS' TRAGEDY.

Pittsburgh, April 5.—While strolling along "lovers' path" near Myrsdale, Pa., Jesse Myers, aged 25 years, daughter of one of the prominent families of that borough, and George Lindaman, aged 23, a mine foreman, fell headlong over a 60-foot cliff, directly on the tracks of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, an express train passing at that instant mangled the bodies practically beyond recognition. The bodies were removed by a train crew and brought to this city.

FERRY BOATS LIBERATED.

Toronto, April 5.—The ferry boats, Alice and Luella, which went down off Mimico during the fog last night, were released by the fire tug Nellie Bly about 1 o'clock this morning, after several hours hard work, during which the tug lost its bow. The boats were seriously damaged. The fog on the bay early this morning was so heavy that boats were compelled to run less than half speed, and to sound their whistles constantly.

CANADA HOUSE.

Montreal, April 5.—It is announced that German people interested in the development of wider trade relations between Canada and Germany, have organized an information bureau in Berlin, to be known as Canada House, where will be available all classes of information about the Dominion, and its trade likely to be useful to a German house desirous of doing business with this country. Mr. J. J. Blakelee, who has travelled extensively in Canada, inquiring into trade matters, will be the manager of the bureau.

POISONED BY MATTRESS

Death of Several Persons Had Been Laid at Relatives' Door.

Boston, April 5.—That the arsenic found in the bodies of the three children of Mrs. Mary Kelleher, of Somerville, and those of her sister, Bridget Knowles, and her husband, Stephen Kelleher, and her husband's sister, Annie Kelleher, got there from a hair mattress on which they all slept at one time or another, and was not willfully administered by Mrs. Kelleher, as charged in the indictment, had a strong bearing in her acquittal by a jury in the superior court of Middlesex County at East Cambridge yesterday. The jury returned a verdict of "not guilty" without leaving their seats by order of Judge Stevens and Sundeel, at the request of District Attorney Higgins.

A few minutes later Mrs. Kelleher left the court house free, after remaining 15 months in jail awaiting trial.

WANT EARLY CLOSING.

Ottawa, April 5.—A deputation of 500, headed by several clergymen of various denominations, and carrying petitions containing several thousand names, waited on the Hull council last night and asked that the hotels of the city be ordered to close at 10 o'clock instead of 11 p.m. There was strong opposition from the liquor interests, and the petitions were tabled until a later date.
