Big Car Skids on the Wet Pavement of a Detroit Avenue.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 14.—Harry Nedelander, Michigan manager of the Haynes Automobile Company, was instantly killed at an early hour this morning when his automobile, carrying four passengers, skidded on the wet pavement and crashed into a telephone pole. His head was crushed.

It was the culmination of a "boy ride" which started at midnight and which had intended visiting the road houses and "grasses" Point ways. Four men and two women were injured and taken to a hospital. Two other girls, who escaped with slight injuries, were taken to their homes. All the girls were members of "The Echo" company, which is playing here this week.

WORK OF BIBLE CLASS

Banquet Held in Talbot Street Baptist Church—Former London Pastor Made Address of the Evening.

The school room of Talbot Street Baptist Church was the scene last evening of the first annual banquet of the Young Men's Bible Class. The affair was very successful, the attendance being in the neighborhood of one hundred, nearly a hundred members of the class and the teachers and officers of the Sunday school. The guests of honor were Rev. Dr. A. T. Sowerby, who, to use Mr. Bingham's words, "is the man who set the Baptist hall rolling in London," but who is now in charge of the work of the college Avenue Baptist Church in Toronto.

The members of the Ladies' Aid in connection with the church, had prepared an excellent report. Mr. Harry Peel presided.

The Toast List.
Mr. Patrick H. Harman proposed the toast to "Our King and Country."

The next toast, "Our Class," was proposed by Mr. A. J. Clark, secretary of the Sunday school, and responded to by Mr. W. C. Young, vice-president of the class. Both gentlemen spoke of the great work of the Bible class, and the influence of such an organization as the Bible Class.

The toast to "Our Church" followed by Mr. W. Richardson, while Mr. J. H. Holman responded.

"Our Guests."
Rev. H. H. Bingham proposed "Our Guests." He thanked the Ladies' Aid for their part in making the evening a success, and welcomed the Sunday school teachers and officers, and the deacons board of the church, who were present. He introduced Dr. Sowerby, and stated that it was his hope that the work of the Talbot Street Baptist Church in London.

Dr. Sowerby was asked to respond. Mr. J. W. Westervelt was called upon for a brief address. Mr. Westervelt dealt with the benefits of the Bible Class to the young men, and emphasized the necessity of such an organization in each church.

Dr. Sowerby was given a hearty reception when he arose to speak. He stated that the man must be insane or mentally imbecile who has not been influenced by the Bible. He said that the signs of the times were the growing institutions that were doing such a great work in bringing the young men into the church, and are providing an excellent church working method.

The speaker then dealt with the origin of the Men's Bible Class movement, and told how he had been instrumental in starting the work in the College Avenue Baptist Church in Toronto. Their work there was so successful that letters had come from all over North America from Baptist people, who were starting the same movement in their own cities.

Men and the Church.
Dr. Sowerby showed how the men were daily being brought in contact with the church, and how the conditions of church work were rapidly changing. The missionary movement had not yet come to the women, but the Laymen's Missionary Movement was getting the men interested, and the possibilities of the future were so great that in five years the movement will be largely re-combined with the present state.

Changing Conditions.
"Conditions and circumstances are rapidly changing," said Dr. Sowerby, "and if we must come with them, we must also change our conditions and methods. Commercial life has become a great factor in the lives of men, and the young men in knee pants and girls in short dresses are sent out to work for their living. Business cares and anxieties are crowded into the
