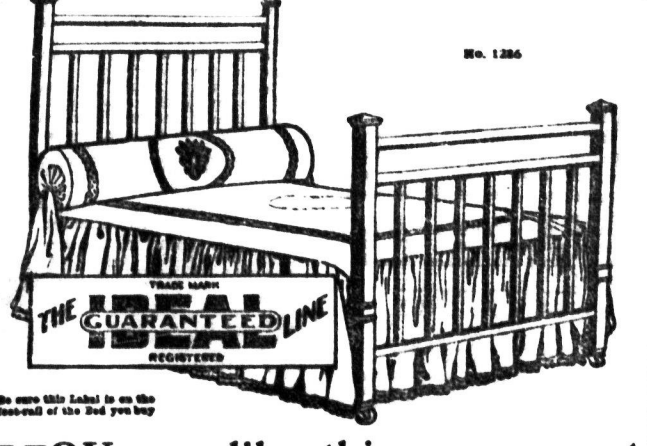

A SHARP SESSION

Montreal Merchant Gets a Year in Jail For Fake Assignment.

Montreal, April 25.—A sharp lesson to traders who show any inclination to make pretence out of business failures was handed out today to S. S. Rasmuski by Justice Weir, when his lordship, without any delay, gave judgment, on the bench sending Rasmuski to jail for a year.

The insolvent defendant, who had conducted two clothing stores on Mount Royal avenue some time ago, made an assignment, in legal phraseology, for the benefit of his creditors. Wilks and Burnett were appointed liquidators. On looking into the accounts they concluded that the creditors were not being treated very well.
