A DUKE IN DISGRACE

Abruzzi Reproved For Failing To Sink Two Turk Warships.

LONDON, March 25.—Information has reached here that the Duke of the Abruzzi, a cousin of King Victor Emmanuel, who is in disgrace at Tarento for having failed to sink two Turkish warships in the Aegean Sea, as he was ordered to do, offered his resignation, but the Italian minister of marine refused to accept it.

King Victor, it is learned, then sent the duke a bitter reproof for having allowed his personal feelings to tempt him to throw up his commission at such a critical time.

Since the opening of the war with Turkey the duke has been in command of a squadron of Italian warships.

MONSIGNOR AYLWARD

ON NE TEMERE DECREE

Is Surprised That the Anglican Church Should Oppose the Church Law.

Rev. Monsignor Aylward, rector of St. Peter's Cathedral, in reply to a query in the "Question Box" at the church, dealt with the Catholic side of the ne temere decree, discussed Sunday evening, expressing his surprise that the Anglican Church especially should join in the discussion against it, in view of what he claimed was a fact that the Church of England was founded upon a violation of the marriage laws.

Mons. Aylward explained that the decree is binding only on the consciences of Catholics, and that the church has never pretended to interfere with civil jurisdiction. Ministers of other denominations, who have engaged in the criticism of the Catholic Church with respect to the ne temere, were criticized.

The attacks of the Methodists, Baptists and three hundred other sects were treated with silent contempt, he said. "But Catholics were surprised that the Church of England should join in the criticism of the decree."

In stating that the Anglican Church was founded on a violation of the marriage laws, Mons. Aylward made reference to King Henry VIII. of England.

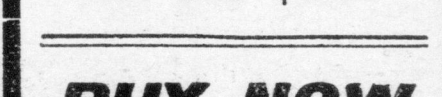

LEFT LIFE OF CRIME FOR WORK IN CHURCH

Mr. John Callahan Spoke Three Times in London on Sunday.

Mr. John Callahan, of the Hadley Hall Mission on the Bowery, New York city, addressed four meetings in London Sunday, morning and evening services and the men's meeting in the afternoon.

Mr. Callahan confined his addresses to the work he is taking part in and stories of some of the incidents so common in his life. But the one that affected his listeners the most was his own account of his life from the time he was put in an orphanage at the age of six years until he was converted in a mission hall in Minneapolis in December, 1890.

He told how he started out to earn his own living when eight years old as a newsboy at the Grand Central Station in New York, and as he grew older he gradually sank into a life of crime. After being arrested several times, and becoming known to the New York police, he decided to go to Chicago, where he was not so well known. However, he soon got in with a gang of criminals, and in a short time was sentenced to a term in Joliet prison. On his release he beat his way to Minneapolis, where he obtained a position as a bartender.

Only two days afterwards, however, he entered a mission hall and was converted, and gave up his bartending. He started to work in the large flour mills in Minneapolis and remained there for five years, until he received a call to go into mission work. He accepted, and for the last sixteen years has been rescuing men from the life he once led himself.

Mr. Callahan stated that no person was beyond help, and said that if Christ be taken into the heart anything is possible. The Askin street male quartette furnished the music at the afternoon meeting.

ARE STORING COAL

MUST WORK AS WELL AS SHOUT

Rev. W. R. McIntosh Referred to Orangemen In His Sermon on Sunday.

CHURCH OF THE FUTURE

Interesting Subject Touched Upon at the King Street Presbyterian Church by the Pastor.

"The Religion of the Future—Protestant or Catholic?" was the subject dealt with by Rev. W. R. McIntosh at the evening service in King Street Presbyterian Church on Sunday before a large congregation. It was the final sermon of a series of subjects dealing with social questions, and was, as Mr. McIntosh stated, the most important of them all.

"I may say," he began, "that this subject is not introduced in any sensational or controversial manner. It has already been introduced in the newspapers. It is a question that Canadians are beginning to ponder over."

Religion in the Future.

"I assume that there will be a religion in the future. That is an assumption which is oftentimes denied. Some men tell us that in the future, science and travel will take the place of religion, and the time will come when put to devotional purposes will be then put into politics for civic development. However, religion has always been in the world. It was not dragged in by anybody, nor was it invented by anybody for a money-making purpose. Religion is an outgrowth of the human soul, and as long as there is an aching heart, a woman's cry, a child's cry, and pathos and sorrow in the world, there will be religion."

Two Great Religions.

"I assume that the religion of the future will be a Christian one. It will be the universal religion of the future. But a question arises. The church that says it is right when it is only inherently right, will lose. The Roman Catholic Church will pass through a man who has paid his church dues, has attended church regularly, but is immoral. We will not do that. The church that has the courage to be moral through and through will win."

A Democratic Church.

"Thirdly, the coming age will be a democratic one. The Roman Catholic Church is opposed to this. It is governed by the priests, while the Protestant Church is governed for the people. They may have the start on us in this, as the priests are better educated, but the religion that depends upon and trusts the people will finally win out. The people will govern themselves by and by. God intended that this earth should be governed by the common people. It is our business to hasten the day. God is on the side of the religion that trusts the people. History proves it. The leading nations of the world are Protestant. The Roman Catholic nations are going back. The Roman Catholic Church has more power in the United States than anywhere else, because it is there that it is most democratic. The Protestant religion creates freedom. The Protestant nations outdistance the Catholic nations in freedom, in glory, and in wealth."

WORTH \$299,491

Largely Invested In Stocks and Bonds and Loan Company Shares.

WILL OF GREAT INTEREST

Annuities Left to Several Individuals Who Are Designated by Initials Only.

Toronto, March 25.—Aside from its pecuniary import, seldom, if ever, has a will of greater interest been filed in the Toronto surrogate court than that of Hon. Edward Blake, which was passed Saturday by Judge Winchester. The total of the estate is \$299,491.94, made up as follows:

In addition to the above are certain properties settled upon Mrs. Blake and Samuel Hume Blake, on August 4, 1885, which are now held by the Toronto General Trusts Corporation, and are not mentioned in the papers filed today.

Interesting points in the will are these:

"I request that my wife will present to each of my children, and to my brother and sister, one article of mine chosen by her as a personal remembrance of me."

S. H. Blake and Professor Wrong are named as literary executors in order that some selections from his writings and speeches may be published in popular form, \$4,000 being bequeathed to defray expenses.

The Beneficiaries.

Margaret Blake, his widow, gets a life interest in the property at 449 Jarvis street, Le Caprice and Maison Rouge at Pointe au Pic, Quebec, and the money payable under the life assurance policy, and cash in hand and on deposit. The contents of 449 Jarvis street are also bequeathed to her, as well as a life interest in the residue of the estate.

Hume Wrong, daughter, benefits to the extent of a contingent interest in the life policy. At the death of Mrs. Blake, Mrs. Wrong is to receive \$2,000 in cash, and the Le Caprice property at Pointe au Pic, and one-fourth share of residue of estate.

Edward William Hume Blake, son, is bequeathed \$6,000, and one-fourth share of residue at the death of Mrs. Blake.

Books and papers are left to Samuel Verschoyle Blake, another son, who also gets \$2,000, and property known as Maison Rouge, and one-fourth share of residue at the death of Mrs. Blake.

Gerald, Margaret, Verschoyle, and Constance, children of E. F. Blake, are to have equally divided among them one-fourth share of residue, and \$5,000 at the death of Mrs. Blake.

Florence Blake, wife of S. V. Blake, receives a contingent life interest in one-fourth share in residue of S. V. Blake.

The children of his son, E. W. Hume Blake, and of his daughter, Sophia Hume Wrong, get a contingent interest in parents' one-fourth share of residue.

Annuities to Initials.

Annuities are left to two individuals who are designated by initials only, C. J. E. and N. J.

Samuel Verschoyle Blake, son, and George M. Wrong, son-in-law, are left a contingent interest of \$4,000 to cover cost of publication of writings.

Some Papers Confidential.

An interesting item of the will is as follows:

"I also bequeath to my son, Samuel Verschoyle Blake, all my books and papers; he taking special care not to divulge any papers confidential in their nature, or which might give pain to others; after the decease of my wife I also bequeath to my said son \$2,000."

"I also appoint the said Samuel Verschoyle Blake and Professor Geo. M. Wrong my literary executors in order that some selections from my political dispatches and writings, and from my political, university, legal, and other speeches may be published in a popular form, towards the expenses of which I leave and bequeath, if necessary, \$4,000. I hope to be able to make some progress in the selection and to leave memoranda as to my views for their consideration."
