CITY'S HEALTH EXCELLENT

**Annual Report Read at Final Meeting
of Board of Health.**
The final meeting of the board of
health for the year was held yester-
day afternoon in Mayor Graham's of-
fice, to wind up the business of 1912.
The annual reports of the officers
were received. Dr. Hutchinson, M.
H. O., commented on the excellent
condition of the city, there had been
no epidemics. There was a noticeable
decrease in the number of deaths by
tuberculosis. During the twelve-
months just passed there were 37
deaths, as compared with 45 in 1911.
There were 46 cases of scarlet fever,
two deaths resulting. Twenty-two
cases of diphtheria were reported, but
eight of these were found to be mere-
ly sore throat. There were two
deaths. Seventy-one cases of whoop-
ing cough had been reported, the
majority during the past two months.
The city council drew the attention
of the board to the insanitary condi-
tions of the lavatory at the Grand
Trunk station. Automatic flushers
were suggested as the only remedy,
and the company will be instructed
to have them installed.
Dr. E. Williams, the retiring chair-
man, thanked the members of the
board for their hearty co-operation
during the year.

**EXPERT IS WANTED
IN MANY PLACES**

**County Council Members Ob-
ject to Mr. G. B. Whale
to Have Office.**

BATEMAN CASE SETTLED

**County Paid \$10,000 in Full to Strath-
roy Physician, Who Was Injured
By a Defective Road.**

Considerable discussion took place at
the meeting of the county council yester-
day afternoon in regard to the terms
upon which the council granted \$500
towards the equipment of the office of
I. B. Whale, the Middlesex representa-
tive of the Ontario department of agri-
culture.

The debate followed a motion of Mr.
J. N. Currie to the effect that a com-
mittee composed of Councillors Hod-
gins, Jackson, McTaggart and Munro
be appointed to arrange with Immigra-
tion Officers Riggs and Mr. Whale for
a meeting, where county publicity work
will be discussed. This resolution was
brought about by a communication
from the Parkhill Board of Trade, ad-
vocating a publicity campaign for the
benefit of the county.

Grant of \$500.
Councillor J. C. McDonald brought to
the attention of the council that the
county grant of \$500 was to be paid
towards the office expenses of an agri-
cultural expert to be connected with a
high school in the county. The office
has been installed in London, and the
expert is not connected with any of
the high schools in the county. Ac-
cording to Mr. McDonald, Mr. Whale
is not well satisfied with having an of-
fice in London, but wants to be in one
of the smaller places throughout the
county. The grant was for the equip-
ment of an office in some of the mu-
nicipalities represented in the county
council, and as he did not deem it
advisable to connect with any of the
terms of the resolution, Mr. Whale
by the present situation of the office
he would not sign the order for the
money to be paid Mr. Whale.

The opinion of Mr. Currie was that
the office in London should be dis-
pensated with, and six or seven branch
offices established in different parts of
the county. What would be the cost
of change his office and furnishings every
six weeks or two months. In this
manner, Mr. Whale could get in touch
with a far larger number of farmers
than he could in London. Mr. Currie
thought that the county would be better
served by the establishment of branch
offices, and that the money now spent on
rent in this city. Councillors Mc-
Gugan, Boyes, Beach and Laidlaw
agreed with Mr. Currie. Mr. Whale
was finally discontinued until after the
meeting to be addressed by Mr. Whale.

Financial Statement.
County Treasurer McEvoy presented
the financial statement for the first
eleven months of the year, which
showed the total receipts from January
to Dec. 2 to be \$324,756.93, and the
disbursements during the same time
amounted to \$305,123.58. Included in
the expenses was the sum of \$7,554.84
for alterations to the court house,
which shows that the county has not
increased its share of the original
estimates towards the repairs. The
county bridges were charged with \$11-
453.63, the system roads, \$30,595.65, and
the system bridges with \$27,172.84. The
report was accepted by the council,
and was ordered to be printed in the
minutes of the present session.

The Bateman Case.
The special committee appointed at
the January session of the council
with power to act in regard to the ac-
tion of Dr. Bateman, of Strathroy, for
damages for injuries received in an
accident on the county road, stated
that the judgment of the court in
favor of Dr. Bateman, for damages
of appeal, reducing the amount of
damages from \$12,500 to \$10,000, had
been accepted upon the advice of Sir
George Gibbons. The committee,
which was composed of Councillors A.
K. Hodgins, J. C. McDonald, R. Banks,
John McQuigan, J. T. Buttery and W. T.
Ulen, instructed the treasurer to pay
Dr. Bateman the amount of the judg-
ment, with interest at 5 per cent. since
the date.

The committee appointed to con-
sider the advisability of a loan to the
proposed county hospital at Strathroy,
recommended the loan of \$15,000 to the
board of the Strathroy Hospital upon
the same terms and conditions as the
loan to Victoria Hospital. Other
recommendations of the committee
were that two trustees be appointed
by the county council, each for two

years, one retiring each year, and that
the hospital board agree to carry all
county patients to the hospital in a
free ambulance. The report was laid
free on the table until a deputation from
Strathroy has appeared before the coun-
cil, which in all probability will be
this afternoon.

County Police.
Councillor W. A. Roberts inquired as
to the methods of appointing officers
as members of the county police force
of late there has been an additional
officer appointed at Birt without the
knowledge of any of the county coun-
cillors or the high constable. High Con-
stable Hughes was asked to explain the
fact that generally the new members of the
force were recommended by several of
the magistrates in the districts in
which they acted.

In this particular case, Mr. Hughes
had not been notified of the appoint-
ment until the man in question asked
for his equipment. Mr. Roberts stated
that there is considerable dissatisfaction
on the part of the neighborhood of
Birt at the appointment, and also stated
that there was considerable spiteful-
ness in connection with the matter.
As far as could be ascertained by the
council, the officer in question was ap-
pointed by the magistrates, and recom-
mended for this one appointment. Mr.
Hughes was also asked the method of dis-
missing a member of the county
police.

The motion presented by C. W.
Hawshaw that W. D. Ferguson be ap-
pointed to the vacancy on the Lan-
cashire high school board, caused by the
resignation of T. A. Webb, was car-
ried.

The Getty Case.
A committee composed of Councillors
Hodgins, Hardy, Ulen, McGugan
and Main was appointed to confer with
the county solicitor in connection with
the county's defence in the Getty
case, which has been entered for trial
at the present sittings of the county
court. H. Hardy stated that he lived
on the next farm to the plaintiff in the
action, and had not heard of the accident
until he read of the suit having been
entered for trial. He stated that his
opinion of the plaintiff had not been con-
sidered taking an action to recover
money until approached by a lawyer.

Hospital Account.
The account of St. Joseph's Hospital
for treatment of patients given to
Rachel Morrison for 14 days, and
amounting to \$9.80, was referred to
the finance committee.

W. N. Nickles asked for the payment
of a claim of \$8,550 for work done on
the Adelaide-East Williams bridge, for
which he was the contractor. At the
time Mr. Nickles examined the specifi-
cations he overlooked the fact that
the contractor was to fill in the ap-
proaches to the bridge, and did not in-
clude the cost of that work in his ten-
der. Mr. Nickles' claim will be consid-
ered by the board of road directors.

The case of Lewis Laporte, who
escaped from the House of Refuge and
was arrested soon after, and is now
confined in the jail, was referred to the
jail committee for consideration.

**C. N. R. REDUCES
LENGTH OF LEASE
TO 83 YEARS**

**City Will Again Take Up the
Offer at the End of
the Week.**

**RENTAL FOR 50 YEARS
WOULD BE \$40,000 YEAR**

**Company Anxious to Get Line
to the Lake and Increase
Amount of Money.**

The Canadian Northern Railway
Company's representatives increased
their cash offer for a lease of the
London and Port Stanley at a confer-
ence with the London and Port Stan-
ley board yesterday afternoon, and re-
duced the term of the lease from 99
to 83 years. The offer was left in
abeyance until later in the week when
another meeting will be held to dis-
cuss the question.

When the board met for the second
time yesterday, Mayor Graham ex-
plained to the representatives of the
C. N. R. that shipyard had informed
him that there would be lower rates
undoubtedly to Port Arthur if the C.
N. R. were given possession of the
London and Port Stanley, but further
than that the present rates would
prevail.

"We will do better than these rates,"
answered Judge Phippen.
Ald. Wright spoke for some time
about the possibility of connection
with the M. C. R. He started Judge
Phippen when he stated that the board
had no guarantee that the C. N. R.
did not have an option on the M.
C. R.

"No more guarantee than that the
M. C. R. has an option on the C. N.
R.," retorted Judge Phippen.

Ald. Wright then returned to the
discussion, laying down what he con-
sidered a reasonable offer.

"I think we should get \$30,000 a
year for the first ten years," said Ald.
Wright. "For the second period \$40-
000, and for the third \$50,000. We
should not lease the road for more
than 30 years under any circum-
stances."

"Of course, if you have something
to dispose of, there is no reason why
you should not do as you wish," said
Judge Phippen. "Under the circum-
stances, you should receive several
offers for the road. Under present
conditions, the terms you outline do
not appear reasonable to us. The offer
might appear so to the M. C. R. or
the P. M., but certainly not to the
C. N. R. You might find it quite easy
to persuade them of its reasonableness."

Must Have Terminals.
"Would you consider a proposition
to handle the London and Port Stan-
ley Railway without the London and
Southeastern terminals?" asked Mayor
Graham.

"No, we could not," answered Col.
Davidson. "We would be bottled up,
and we would not have nearly enough
room to expand and grow."

Judge Phippen asked whether or
not the city would consider an offer
to the road on a percentage basis.
Mayor Graham himself thought the
idea a good one, but the board would
not accept it. His worship pointed
out that the annual charges on the
road amounted to about \$34,000 a
year, and he considered that the city
should obtain sufficient to make the
line self-sustaining.

The New Offer.
Judge Phippen then made his new
offer: \$20,000 for the first three years,
\$25,000 for the next 30 years, and \$40-
000 for the next 50 years. He ex-
plained that the road would not make
much during the first three years ow-
ing to the lack of connection with
the main line. He also waived his de-
mand for fixed taxation.

"The amounts we offer will aver-
age up about \$34,000 a year," Judge
Phippen explained. "Everything else
we offered goes with this."

After some further discussion Mayor
Graham informed the deputation that
the matter would be sent to the coun-
cil. A definite decision would be ar-
rived at this week, and the C. N. R.
officials would be invited to hear it.
