SIR WILFRID EXPLAINS ISSUE BETWEEN LIBERALS AND GOVT. OVER BORDEN NAVAL BILL

Liberal Leader Replies to the Premier's Manifesto Explaining How Present Situation Arose and Shows That Borden Closure Threat Means a Curbing of Free Speech.

Ottawa, March 21. — Sir Wilfrid Laurier, leader of the Opposition, has authorized the following statement of the Liberal position on the naval bill, in reply to the statement issued by the Government Thursday:

"The present issue between the Government and the Opposition is clearly and easily defined.

"The Government is asking for a contribution of thirty-five million dollars out of the Canadian treasury to the imperial navy, under the pretence of an emergency. The discussion has shown that such an emergency does not exist, and it would seem that this is the first of periodical permanent contributions.

"The policy of the Liberal party is the same as it ever was: A Canadian navy built (as far as immediately practicable), equipped, maintained and manned in Canada. This policy is now in concrete form before the House, Mr. Guthrie having moved an amendment, still undisposed of, that the thirty-five million dollars asked by the Government be expended in Canada in the construction and equipment of naval forces.

"The Rules. The object of the Opposition during the present debate has been to bring this issue as prominently as possible to the attention of the people, and that they still propose to do by all constitutional means at their disposal.

"It is stated on behalf of the Government that the rules of the House are antiquated. These rules have grown to their present form through long centuries of struggle on behalf of freedom of speech. The late Government persistently refused to alter them, but they were carefully revised only three years ago, and unanimously adopted as they now stand.

"It is also hinted on behalf of the Government that the discussion was unduly lengthened before the vote on the second reading of the naval bill.

A comparison of the discussion on this bill with the discussion on the naval bill of 1910 shows this allegation to be absolutely unfounded. In fact, the number of speeches delivered on the second reading of the present bill and the resolution on which it was founded was 77 (49 on the resolution, 28 on the bill), whereas the number of speeches on the bill of 1910 was 86.

"What Started Fight. "The bill was referred to the committee of the whole Feb. 28, and a discussion at once arose upon the cost of naval vessels of different classes. Certain figures were produced by the Government, and as their accuracy was challenged by the Opposition, the Government promised to produce some further information at the next sitting. The House, consequently, adjourned after voting the first clause of the bill. On March 3 the House went again into committee on the bill at 10:30 p.m., and the same discussion was resumed and carried on until 1:30 a.m., practically between Mr. Borden and Mr. Hazen for the Government, and Messrs. Pugsley, Macdonald and Carvell for the Opposition. At 1:30 a.m. Mr. Rogers, who had been out of the House and who had taken no part in the discussion, came in and raised the point that such a discussion was out of order. He practically took the lead out of the hands of the leader. His point of order was maintained by the chairman, and it was

Incinerator Chimney Stood Well. The tall incinerator chimney stood the test well, although from its exposed position, once wind ripped round it with what must have been terrific force. Across the river could be seen the

top section of a big smokestack of the Wilcox factory, humping lumpy from the lower section and swaying in the wind.

Many Smokestacks Went. In the southerly section of the city, fences went down in every direction. Outbuildings were overturned, and huge limbs were rent from trees in several instances. Not a few chimneys of private houses went by the board, and bricks could be seen scattered about on the roofs and on the ground beneath.

Called Carpenters. A number of carpenters were working on a building across from Woolworths, Limited, on Dundas street, when the windows in the latter store blew in. The manager was inside, and he immediately hurried across to the men and asked for assistance in boarding up the rest of the windows to keep them from being destroyed by the wind.

Fire Chief Arrives. Fire Chief Aitken arrived on the scene, and after inspecting the windows went all over the down section in an endeavor to eliminate all possible danger to pedestrians.

When the carpenters started to work on the buildings it was next to impossible for one man to hold an inch board and put it in position against the window.

Blew Lumber Away. Several boards were left lying on the road, and suddenly a heavy gust of wind lifted three of them in the air and blew them against a knot of spectators, seriously bruising one of them. A few moments later a gust of wind struck the windows in the down section and story over the Thorne shoe store, and ripping it out carried it for 300 feet east on Dundas street. It fell to the pavement and smashed. Into a thousand pieces at the feet of a group of men who were watching the carpenters struggling with the lumber.

Flag Pole Went. The big flag pole on top of The Advertiser building was blown over, and hung suspended above the street for some time, while an electric sign in front of the Olympia candy store was blown in halves.

A large board sign in front of French's store and one next door were also torn down, and a block farther east electric signs in front of the Westman Street Shirt Company and the Raphael Company were partly torn from their moorings.

Did Weird Stunts. During the gale the wind committed many freak stunts. The roof of the Globe Casket Company's building. The wind tore a hole in the middle of it near the Dundas street side. It continued along the roof and laid a pathway about a foot wide through the tiles for a distance of several feet.

STORM SWEEPS CITY CAUSING MUCH DAMAGE

CHIMNEYS ALLOVER TUMBLE TO GROUND

Buildings in Course of Construction Wrecked by Wind.

Pedestrians in Street Have a Rough Time With Violent Breeze.

For several hours Friday, London found herself in the throes of battle, with an equinoctial gale, which swept almost the whole North American continent. Building in course of construction, roofs razed, chimneys blown over, windows shattered, fences swept away, and pedestrians driven to shelter. Nobody was seriously injured although there were several close calls.

The damage to property will amount to many thousands of dollars. The Telephone Company, the hydro-electric department, the telegraph companies, and others having transmission wires, were heavy losers. The damage on chimneys alone was great, not to speak of the destruction done otherwise.

Hospital Got Full. Victoria Hospital, situated high on the north bank of the south branch of the Thames River, felt the full force of the gale. The wind swept up the river from the west, churning the water into whitecaps, and battering at the group of buildings which extend along the crest of the hill.

Chimney Remained Intact. A chimney on building to the rear was overturned, breaking off close to the base and falling in a solid mass to the roof. The roof withstood the strain, and the chimney now lies there with hardly a brick displaced. Another chimney at the rear of one of the hospital buildings proper, went over while the storm was at its height. It fell to the north and broke in the centre over the peak of the roof. No damage was done.

Swept Across Park. The open expanse of Victoria Park afforded a fine sweep for the storm. All day long the trees rocked and swayed many of the smaller branches being scattered over the ground.

One tree near the Soldiers' Monument was badly split when a large limb was torn from its trunk. Most of the lamps lost their large white globes, which are scattered in fragments over the turf today.

At the residence of Mr. W. D. Quigley, 400 Oxford street, shortly after 1 o'clock a tall chimney crashed down onto the roof, the heavy weight of bricks and mortar piercing it as though it had been paper. Right into the attic it plunged, and through the ceiling of the bedroom below, which was strewn with mass of wreckage.

Mr. Quigley was seated in the next room and considers his escape very fortunate. Twelve rafters of the roof without broken, and it will be necessary to remove nearly the whole of one side to effect repairs.

Unpiled Lumber. Large piles of lumber in the George Belton lumber yard were twisted around as if by giant hands, and a huge fence and signboard were blown right across Rectory street, completely blocking the street, railway track at the Grand Trunk crossing.

The Ideal Concrete Company was one of the worst sufferers from the gale. Last fall a concrete storeroom was built on Kitchener avenue, and in were stored cement mixing machines worth \$60,000. A number of men were working in the building Friday morning getting stuff ready for shipment.

Fifteen minutes after they left, the gale caught the northwest corner of the roof and lifted a section 50 feet long and 50 feet wide into the air, turning it completely over and depositing it on the other side of the building.

Part of the roof, weighing many tons, fell on a galvanized iron oil building, and only slightly dented it.

Lifted Concrete Blocks. A large block of cement weighing about three tons, was lifted off the corner of the buildings and blown six feet, while heavy steel girders were carried through the air and twisted into unrecognizable masses.
