**HOUSE PROBLEM
FACES NEWCOMERS
AT QUEEN'S PARK**
Cannot Secure Domiciles and
Western Fair Will Re-
quire Present Quarters.

**Immigrants Unwilling Guests of
City—Very Few Going
to Farms.**

To be the unwilling guests of the
city because of inability to secure
dwelling houses at a reasonable figure,
or in fact at almost any figure, is the
predicament of a number of newly-ar-
rived English families who at present
are housed in one of the buildings at
Queen's Park. Some have arrived with-
in the last few days, while others have
been there almost a month, but all de-
clare that it is impossible to secure
houses in any section of the city. Fif-
teen families are at present quartered
at the exhibition grounds, numbering
in all over fifty people. They were
notified a short time ago that they
were to vacate the premises by the
seventeenth of July in order that the
building might be put in shape for the
Western Fair, but as one woman ex-
pressed it, "Where can we go? They
can't turn us out on the street with
our children, and we simply can't get
houses."

A Problem for Mr. Riggs.
Just what will have to be done in
the matter is a problem which
Dominion Immigration Agent Riggs
will soon have to face. All of the men
have succeeded in securing em-
ployment, but none have succeeded in
finding suitable dwellings to which
they can move with their families.

Meanwhile the discomforts of life in
the fair grounds buildings are many
and varied. The long period of waiting
is proving especially trying on the
young children, of whom there are a
number. It is impossible to watch them
continually, one mother informed The
Advertiser reporter, and the result is
that there is constant dread of ac-
cidents. Automobiles and wagons are
continually passing through the King
street gate, near which the buildings
are situated, and the youngsters play-
ing around outside are in danger of
being run over, and the mothers are
anxiously awaiting some solution of
the problem which will enable them
to leave the fair grounds.

Few Go to Farms.
Nearly all of the men of the last
party have found employment in the
city very few having out with the
farmers. This is not in accordance with
the original plan, and many of the
farmers have expressed themselves
strongly on the subject, claiming that
the tide of immigration which is
being diverted to this section of the
country is not relieving them at all.
On the other hand, the immigrants
claim that the farmers themselves are
to blame. The latter do not want to
take married men with children, and
the newcomers have no alternative but
to find employment in the city. The
farmers, it is claimed, visit the fair
grounds whenever a number of new
arrivals come in, and having picked out
the young unmarried men, they never
come back. The wages paid for farm
labor are far from being adequate in
many instances, it is also claimed. One
man with a wife and four children,
agreed to go to a farm near Granton
as a farm laborer. He made no spec-
ific agreement with the farmer as to
wages, but was told that would be
arranged later. He spent nearly all of
the remaining funds removing his
family to Granton, and when he ar-
rived there was offered \$15 a month
and free house and vegetables. The re-
sult of the necessities of life he would
have to provide. Why it was ridi-
culous, he remarked, "I couldn't begin to
keep my family on that, and I told
him so, I brought them back to the
exhibition grounds, and succeeded in
getting a job on the corporation for
the present, and I have prospects of a
permanent situation soon, but I can't
get a house anywhere."

Such is the complaint on every hand
in regard to the housing problem, and it
looks as though some decisive move
will have to be made in the near future
if these people are to be cared for
after the Western Fair begins.

**IRISHMEN DISCUSS PICNIC

**PRIVATE MAY KEPT ALIVE
BY GREAT WILL POWER**

Although Terribly Crushed, the
Doctors Think That He
May Recover.

Private Richard May, of the Army
Service Corps, who was so seriously
injured in a runaway during the mili-
tary camp a month ago, is still in
Victoria Hospital in a critical condi-
tion.
Mr. May was caught between a
heavy army wagon and a tree at the
corner of Oxford and Adelaide streets,
when the team which he was driving
ran away.
He was taken to the field hospital at
the time of the accident, and kept
there for nearly a week, as it was
thought his injuries were not serious.
He grew worse, however, and was
removed to Victoria Hospital for an
operation. While on the table the
hydro lights went out, and the work
had to be finished by gaslight. It is
said that owing to the failure of the
light the operation was not as suc-
cessful as it might have been.

Physicians say it is a marvel that
he has lived as long as he has. Dur-
ing the time he has been in the hos-
pital he has been unable to eat any-
thing, and the doctors claim that his
will power, which is wonderful, is the
only thing that is keeping him alive.
They also say that if he continues to
bear up there is a possibility of his
getting better.
