

ed us play baseball, and in a month, before he had picked up the language, he was talking baseball argot, and playing better than any of us. He learned our ways quickly, became a cracking ball player, a royal good, reckless youth. One day Fritz quarrelled with his uncle and

In that fall I received a letter from Emmerling at Bristol, Tenn., saying he had a ball player on his semi-pro team who was a wonder, better than any outfielder Chicago had. I then had moved to Chicago. He said this playeryoung Milan-was going into the little mounain league, and to watch him,
I watched Milan's records. Also I wrote Fritz Emmerling, but the letter came back marked "No such party known."

That fall there came another letter from Fritz, urging me to try to get a job for Milan. I tried. Four managers refused to listen.

Then Milan appeared for a try-out with the Washington team. From the first he showed his speed, his nerve, his eagerness to learn. He had only one fault, oversliding bases, and all year he worked and worked to correct this. In another year he was a star, one of the greatest outfielders in the country.

Meantime I heard that Fritz Emmerling was

dead. I had forgotten his name-or what posi-One night a few years ago Milan and I were sitting in front of the team's hotel at Washington. He turned to me suddenly and re-

"You put me in this business." "I," I replied astounded. "I never you until you broke in here." You taught a kid named Fritz Emmerling to play, didn't you?" he asked.


