

THRIFT CAMPAIGN IS TO BE WAGED BY "Y" DURING THIS MONTH

Factories and Institutions Will Be Canvassed.

GROUP BANKING IS PLAN

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To promote thrift among the employees of factories and other institutions throughout Canada, the Y. M. C. A. all over the country will observe a national thrift week, commencing on January 13. Preparations for the campaign are being made by the local association.

It is not the intention of the association to advocate mere tightwad boarding, but because of the present economic situation, the high cost of living and low wages, it is believed that people are in need of advice and instruction in regard to thrift and the saving of money. To accomplish this many ways were considered, but it was decided that an organized campaign with extensive advertising would be the best way to make work definite and striking.

All to Co-operate. In these campaigns the Y. M. C. A. will not try to work alone, but will co-operate with many individuals and institutions as can be interested. Insurance men will be asked to speak to groups and to issue advertisements not upon the value of their respective companies, but upon the value of insurance in itself. Bankers will be asked to show the value of banking and so on, and contractors, lawyers, merchants, ministers will be enlisted and asked to co-operate in their own field of activities.

The work in Canada will be carried on in conjunction with a similar campaign in the United States. Even greater efforts will be made in this country to promote saving. Saving clubs in the factories will be established and the banking done in groups. It is said to work in the larger cities, but the local officials say that the scheme does not succeed in small towns.

New Department. So many associations have already done work along this line that at the Detroit convention of the "Y" a short while ago, it was recognized as a new department and so was added to the regular program of activities of the association. So that co-operation between the associations of both countries would be facilitated, literature which is being printed in New York for the campaign has as little of the name of the American Y. M. C. A. as could be arranged.

The local campaign will be under the supervision of Robert Laidie, the industrial secretary of the "Y." To aid in the work he has secured many films on the value of thrift. These he will show in the different factories.

INSPECTOR GREATLY PLEASED AT SUCCESS OF WESTERN LIBRARY

Delighted With Rapid Progress Made At "U."

Warm praise for the work that has been done in connection with the organizing and building up of Western University library is voiced by W. O. Carson, inspector of public libraries in Ontario, who was in the city this week. Mr. Carson made a careful examination of the university libraries, both as to the resources, the catalogues, technical work, etc., and expresses himself as surprised by the amount of work that has been done in the last two years. He pointed out that the library is under the supervision of the university library committee, of which Dr. Walter B. Carson is chairman.

Mr. Carson pointed out that the work of organizing a big library is a slow process, but at Western the rate of progress has been achieved that is surprising. He pointed out that the additional to the library have been extensive and have been exceedingly well selected, while there is everywhere a manifestation of the intelligent direction that has been given to the work.

Fortunate in Official.

"Western University library is fortunate in having Miss Marjorie Ross as its driving head," Mr. Carson stated. "I can also say that the library committee, under Dr. Walter's chairmanship, has been able to achieve things on a minimum of expense. Good use has been made of student help, and particularly good work has been done by W. J. Hodder in the libraries of the Health, as well as at the art library. Mr. Carson pointed out that Miss Ross holds a first grade certificate in library work from the department of education, the highest grade awarded, and that Miss Ross, who is in charge of the library staff, has recently been awarded similar standing. Out of 140 students possessing through the library school in the last four years, only 21 have been awarded standing, and Western University has two of these on its staff, while London public library has two others.

Great Asset. Mr. Carson states that in the Barnett collection of books that the university asset, not only for the university, but for London as a city. "In many respects Western's book collection is unrivalled in the province," he said, "chiefly by reason of the large number of valuable volumes in the Barnett library. There is considerable work ahead in organizing the great resources, but Dr. Barnett has the books arranged in the most usable form. The value of this library will increase every year, as its books become more and more available for students and investigators."

It is understood that the educational authorities at Toronto have been much gratified by the large growth of the Western University libraries, and Mr. Carson pointed out that the citizens of London have in their public library system and the university library, greater facilities for reading and study than are possessed by any other place of similar size in Canada.

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During the evening a brief musical program was presented, Miss Jean Metcalfe and Miss Amy Macdonald, two selections on the piano. Roy Freeman gave a solo.
