JERSEY CITY, N.J., July 4.—Jack Dempsey, still the heavyweight champion of the world, celebrated Fourth of July today in addition to celebrating his victory over Georges Carpentier, the European, Saturday.

Dempsey plans to remain in this vicinity for several days, when he will go to Lake City, his home, for a vacation and rest from his long training grind.

The champion yesterday saw himself in action. He motored to a motion picture theatre that was showing pictures of the great encounter. Huddled in a back seat alongside of Jack Kearns, his manager, and Mike Trant, the Chicago detective, Dempsey watched the fight. He also saw the picture of the boxer who was to make good his threat to carry the title across the sea.

Dempsey saw himself totter and sway as the Frenchman sent those punches to his jaw. Perhaps not until he saw the picture did he realize just how close he had been to dropping to the canvas floor, for after the fight Dempsey declared the blows had not bothered him.

As Dempsey saw himself on the screen inflicting punishment upon his lighter opponent his eyes sparkled, and an exclamation of admiration for the way Carpentier gamely came back.

"He did that Mike, now, didn't he?" whispered the champion to Trant, and his husky bodyguard assented with "he did that, Jack, he did that."
