WORLD NEWS

CUT SHORT
MONTEVIDEO, April 30.—The National Council of Administration has published a declaration establishing the proprietorship of the government in the eight former German vessels requisitioned by Uruguay in the world war.

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The civil authorities now have resumed full charge of the jail, all the troops being withdrawn. Damage amounting to £20,000 was done to prison property.

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MOSCOW, April 30.—Incendiaries, according to the Pravda, recently set on fire some of the largest oil wells in the Baku region, and it was with great difficulty that the remaining wells in the oil fields were saved. The Pravda charges that the incendiaries were the work of social revolutionaries, two of whom were arrested.

In consequence of the fire the output in the Baku district has been reduced to 100,000 pounds (a pool is 36 pounds) of oil daily.

PARIS, April 30.—King Gustaf V. of Sweden, whose automobile was overturned near Serres Friday by the car of a wealthy Italian banker, M. Vigliani, stated today he would bring a suit for 100,000 francs damages in the name of his chamberlain against the banker. The condition of the chamberlain is critical as he is suffering from internal injuries. A special train, ordered by the king, conveyed the injured man to Grenoble. The king left Geneva yesterday for Baden.

LONDON, April 30.—The Berengaria, the latest and greatest of the Cunard Line's Atlantic fleet, arrived at Southampton from the Tyne, after a successful trial under oil fuel. She covered 391 sea miles in just over 21 hours. Her conversion from coal to oil burning and her reconditioning have been carried out by Armstrong, Whitworth & Co. She sails for New York on May 20. The Mauretania and the Aquitania are her sister ships. Among them they will maintain the fastest ocean service in the world. There is great expectation that the Berengaria will beat her speed record.

MEXICO CITY, April 30.—Serious disturbances are reported at Guanajuato, capital of the state of the same name, where a textile factory owned by Dr. Buscho Gonzales, a Spaniard, was closed several days ago after a protracted strike. There have been several clashes between the striking workmen and those who remained loyal to their employer, the situation becoming so acute yesterday that troops patrolled the streets adjacent to the factory.

The government is making efforts to govern and operate the plant, as was done recently in the case of the Alcala textile factory strike here, but Dr. Gonzales is opposing this plan and has obtained a stay of proceedings through the state courts.

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Thomas W. Lamont of J. P. Morgan & Co., who has been discussing a general plan for funding the Mexican debt and the obligation of the Mexican national railways with a committee of international bankers in Paris, is expected to return to the United States by May 28, according to Secretary de la Hueria, and the conference will start soon thereafter.

Senor de la Hueria is optimistic of the results of the conference, and predicts, as one of the results of the financial arrangements to be made, the establishment of a Banco Unico, or single bank of emission.

MOSCOW, April 30.—The famous Troitzki, or Trinity, Cathedral in Petrograd has been robbed of all its valuables. Similar robberies are reported at various other places, but generally speaking the requisitioning of church valuables is proceeding with little difficulty.

The removing of the valuables from the churches in Moscow is about three-fourths completed. The aggregate of treasure taken includes silver by the ton, gold by the hundredweight, pearls by the bushel and diamonds by the peck. The valuables are stored in boxes and placed in warehouses under guard, where they await sorting.

The treasure boxes from Moscow alone are heaped to the ceiling. The boxes seen by the correspondent filled one floor 100 feet long and 45 feet wide. Four other floors are being used for storing the treasures from the provinces.

THE HAGUE, April 30. — The
