Today the Canadian dollar stood at a premium of 3-32, and since April, save for a single dip in May, it has been on a parity with the United States dollar or at a premium.

Experts pointed out that trade reports showed heavy purchases by United States customers in the dominion, that a large development of power was shortly to be made by United States capital in Quebec, and that this year was a bumper one for tourists
