

FRUITMEN BACKING GOVERNMENT PLAN

President of Ontario Growers Declares It Will Give Best Protection To Farmers.

DUTY IS HIGH NOW

Burlington, Ont., Oct. 26.—There's a little lesson in simplified mathematics originally expounded by a Norfolk county farmer, that never fails to raise a smile when the high protection argument is offered Canadian fruit growers. Paul A. Fisher, president of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association, has heard the yarn, and finds it appropriate.

"I have two smart sons," said the Norfolk county farmer. "There never were boys quite so clever. Why, do you know, when it rains those boys go out into the barn and trade jackknives, and in a single afternoon they'll make 30 or 40 cents out of each other."

That is the answer of the president of the fruit growers to the argument of protecting the fruitman by a higher tariff.

Is Already Higher.

Sought by an Advertiser reporter at the Fisher orchards, Burlington, Mr. Paul Fisher today quickly dispelled the Conservatives' cry that

Prowling Hen Is Murdered

Chatham, Oct. 26.—Arthur Cartier, Sheldon avenue, today found his prize chicken dead in its coop with a note pinned to its body, which read: "Keep chicken home."

It was a Rhode Island Red, valued at \$25, which had carried off scores of prizes at recent fairs and shows. Cartier has lost other prize chickens in a similar fashion, which has prompted police to investigate. Petty spite work is indicated, police say.

They have watched the interests of the fruit growers when they were in power. He scoffed the inconsistent argument that Canada needed a duty on fruit as high as the U. S. tariff.

His answer was: "Canada has a higher duty than the United States now on every fruit, except pears."

The Fisher brothers operate a fruit farm just outside of Burlington. They have gotten on very comfortably under existing tariff conditions. They believe that their needs, as well as the requirements of every Canadian fruit man, have been looked after by Liberal administrations.

"What do the fruit men think of the Conservative fruit tariff argument?" Mr. Paul Fisher was asked.

"Well, with the Conservatives posing as the special watchdogs of the fruit and vegetable interests, it's interesting to turn to the Canada customs tariff schedule to see who has looked after us in the last 20 years," returned the fruit men's president.

"You have had plenty of promises," The Advertiser remarked.

"Stories are good at that sort of time before election," declared Mr. Fisher. "But Mr. Meighen's only revision all the time he was in office was to put potatoes on the free list."

"How about the promises in this campaign?"

Making Many Promises.

"Why, Meighen's candidates in fruit and vegetable-growing constituencies are making all sorts of promises that are pretty much sweeping generalities after all. They want a tariff as high as Hamen's gallows. Some of them are even going so far as to promise duties as high as the United States tariff—a tariff built brick for brick with the Yankees."

"How do the American and Canadian duties on fruits and vegetables compare?"

"Nearly every tariff on foreign fruits entering Canada has been the result of Liberal legislation."

Mr. Fisher pointed out that present customs duties on almost all varieties of Canadian fruits and vegetables are the same as originated or revised by the Laurier or King government. In every case except one these duties are as high as the U. S. tariff for similar products. The duty on pears is lowest. Mr. Meighen's single change in the fruit and vegetable produce tariff was the sweeping away of tariff on potatoes, an article which has since been offset by the Liberal government.

"What about the Liberal program?" Mr. Fisher was asked. "Do you think it will help the fruit growers?"

"Would Probe Situation."

"The tariff commission will investigate the situation. The government realizes that any revision in the tariff is likely to remain for some time. Therefore it is essential to act wisely."

"How about 'dumping' of fruit from the United States?"

"The government knows that the tariff, no matter how high, will not be effective unless a 'dumping' act, that is workable, is provided. The large distributing agencies of the States use our Toronto and Montreal markets as dump markets in order to keep their own larger markets from stagnating. It will be a very good thing for Canadian fruit and vegetable growers when such a dumping act, as is now under consideration by the Liberals, is put into effect."

"Is the tariff commission the most practical solution?"

"Only Sensible Solution."

"Absolutely, it is the only sensible solution," went on Mr. Fisher.

Mr. Fisher sums up the fruit growers' viewpoint to government in definite, clean-cut support for Mackenzie King.

"The Liberal policy," he concluded, "is to act for the fruit and vegetable growers. The Conservative policy is to promise before election and then they did nothing during the ten years they were last in office, except for Mr. Meighen's potato revision in 1919 to put potatoes on the free list."

CHAMPIONS HELP SET NEW WORLD RECORD

Commodore Greening, With bow IV., Breaks Own Mark On Canadian Lake.

"The feat of Commodore Harry B. Greening, of Hamilton, Ont., in averaging 50.78 miles an hour for 24 hours with his motorboat, Rainbow IV, Oct. 3, breaking all world's speed records on the water, is one that would have been impossible three years ago," says M. C. Dewitt, vice-president of the Champion Spark Plug Company, whose spark plugs were used to make both the previous and the new records.

"Improvements in design and materials, including the use of silluminite in our product, made this new record possible."

Nearly three hours before the end of the 24-hour run on Lake Rosseau, one of the Muskoka group, north of Toronto, Commodore Greening's little boat had surpassed the previous record of 1964 miles made by Rainbow III. This time, due to the smoothness and power shown by his engine and spark plugs, he exceeded his own optimistic estimate by more than 30 miles, covering 1218.79 miles.

"We put the spark plugs in the engine two days before the run started, and never looked at them again until it was all over," Commodore Greening informed the Champion company. "They performed perfectly every minute."

PISTOLS, STONES USED IN MEETING IN QUEBEC

Battle Royal Ensues When Great Hall Is Thrown Into Darkness.

Quebec, Oct. 26.—The sudden severing of electric wiring, which threw the place into utter darkness while Premier Taschereau was speaking, followed by revolver shots, stage-thrashing and general pandemonium, made a political meeting at Chateau Richer in Charlevoix county without precedent in the history of that constituency.

The meeting was held in the interests of P. P. Casgrain, Liberal candidate, who had the support of the prime minister of the province of Quebec. It was while Mr. Taschereau was addressing the crowd that all the lights suddenly went out.

A battle royal ensued in the darkness and after stones had been heaved in the direction of the platform the sudden barking of a revolver broke out above the din. The shots were answered by other weapons outside the building, whose owners, according to accounts of the evening, began taking "pot shots" at passing automobiles.

When the uproar was at its height and it seemed certain there must be many serious casualties, the wiring was repaired and the flood of light brought the turmoil to a close.
