Mr. Shuttleworth, fruit dealer, of this city, has shipped over 60,000 barrels of apples to the English market this season, all of which were purchased in Western Ontario.
 Thos. Fogarty and Wm. Collins were arrested by Constable McLeod, of London, and not by Allan, of London. A gold watch and \$6 found on them is now in Mr. McLeod's possession.

It is proposed to incorporate the Wm. Weld Company, limited, of this city, for the purpose of acquiring the business, plant and good-will of the Farmers' Advocate. The capital stock is \$40,000.
 In Reilly vs. city of London, Justice Falconbridge has refused the motion to postpone the trial unless the plaintiff submits to examination of her person by surgeons chosen by the defendants.

On Saturday last a man whose name is not known attempted to get on the Express going east at Ailsa Craig, but was thrown down and dragged into the cattle guard. He was picked up insensible, but not seriously injured.
 The grocery store of Kanady & Besson, of Windsor, was sold here the other day to A. Gregory, formerly of Sparta. The new firm will be A. Gregory & Co. They will retain the services of Mr. Kanady, formerly of the old firm.

The Reform Association of the North Riding of Middlesex met at Ailsa Craig yesterday, a large number of delegates being present, and decided to protest the election of W. H. Hutchins, M.P., at the last general election.
 At Osgoode Hall on Saturday, in Morkin vs. Ardell, Mr. J. McG. Young, for the defendant, moved to dismiss the action for want of prosecution and to set aside the notice of trial. Motion refused. Costs to the plaintiff in any event.

A recent addition to London's trotters is the chestnut stallion Garnet, by prior, dam by Pocahontas Boy, etc. It comes here to be developed by his owner, Trainer Mel. Odell. He promises something more than the ordinary race horse, and if everything goes well he will be heard from later.
 Mr. Charles B. Hewitt died on Saturday at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. D. Hanvey, St. Thomas, aged 81 years. He was born in the State of New York, and came to this country in 1829, and did an extensive lumber business at Vienna, in 1842 he, with a partner, built the old plank road from London to Port Stanley.

Mr. N. S. Hays, 185 Bathurst street, who came here last year to be treated for cancer, has got along so well that he expects to return to his home in a few days. His delay has been partly owing to the distance he has had to come, being from Alwood, Kansas. He did not wish to return until satisfied that all was right.
