How Vancouver Celebrated its Great Festivity-A Grand Turnout-Everyone Pleased.

When the Smith vs. Heath.—(Judgment)—In this case the appellant was convicted of soliciting orders for the supply of goods by retail, to be furnished by a firm outside the province, neither he nor they having any permanent place of business here, and without having taken out a license, contrary to the Municipalities Act of 1891, which forbids such retail transactions.

The defence is limited to this, that the sale solicited was not by retail, but, wholelength. There were unique and original features too numerous for description.
