OUEBEC POLITICAL HISTORY

The Record of Administration in that Province since Confederation.

Since Confederation five general ele heve been held in the Province of Quebec. namely. in 1871, 1875, 1878, 1881, and 1886 With the exceptions of a brief period in 1878, the Conservatives have held office broughout. On July 15, 1867, after Conederation, the Conservatives entered upon their lease of power in the Province under the following Ministry:—P. J. O. Chauveau, G. Ouimet, Q. C., Attorney-General; C. Dunkin, Q. C., Treasurer; J. O. Beaubien, Commissioner of Crown Lands; L. Archambault, Cominssioner of Agriculture and Public Works; C. B. DeBoucherville, Speaker of the Council; G. Irvine, Q. C., Solicitor-General. This Ministry, with internal changes, was confirmed in power at the general state of 1271 which recorded in the eral election of 1871, which resulted in the return of about forty Conservatives to twenty-Liberals or Independents. On February 27, 1873, the Ministry was rearranged, Premier Chauveau retiring, and being succeeded by Hon. G. Onimet, Secretary and Registrar, Premier; Hon. G. Irvine, Attorney-General Hon. J. G. Robertson, Treasurer; Hon. Dr Fortin, Commissioner of Crywn Lands; L. Archambault, Commissioner of Agriculture and Public Works; Hon. J. J. Ross, Speaker of the Council, and Hon. J. A. Chapleau, Solicitor-General. This Cabinet was confirmed in power at the general election of 1875, in which were returned about 50 Conservatives to 15 Liberals and Independents.

RELICS OF A LOST TRIBES

Dening the Graves of Red Hon Whon the Whites Exterminated.

Relies of the extinct race of Indiana who were the aboriginal inhabitable of Newfound-land were recently discovered on Pilley's Island, Notre Dame Bay. The relice are very interesting. Very few remains of the vanished race of the Bethuks have been pre-served. There are a few in private hands, and the Newfoundland Museum contains a small collection, including a skull and skeleton, some arrow heads, axes, gouges, and other stone implements. In the recent excavation one of the graves was found to contain the skull of an adult in an excellent state of preservation. It has the characteristics of the skull of a savage, but it is well shaped and pretty well developed in the in-tellectual region. The skull proves that the Bethuke were by no means of a low type.
Only three honce of the ekeleton were found along with the skull. Foxes or wolves had probably carried off the others. The greatest curiosity, however, is the other skeleton. which, with the exception of the vertebes of the neck is perfect. Apparently, it is the skeleton of a young Bethuk 9 or 10 years of age. The bady had been wrapped in birch bark, laid on its side, and covered with stones. The form was seen to be perfectly preserved when the birch wrappings were re oved, and it has somewhat

THE APPEARANCE OF A MUMMY. The skull is detached from the body, the vertebræ of the neck having been destroyed or removed. There are also in the collection several specimens of beautifully finished stone arrow heads, hatchets, various article nade from birch bark, such as small models of canoes, drinking vessels, etc., and curious ly shaped bone ornaments, all worthy of scientific examination. These, according to the Indian custom, were buried with the dead. The aborigines of Newfoundland wer branch of the great and powerful Algonquins, who once lived from the Rocky Mou tains to Newfoundland, and from Labrado to the Carolinas. Here they hunted an fished for ages before the discovery of the island by Cabot. It was a dark day for these poor savages when the pale faces appeared. Quarrels arose, and at length it became war to the knife between the two races. The armed with muskets. Great cruelties were practised by the whites, and the Indians savagely retaliated. The whites at length came to regard the aborigines as vermin to be exterminated, and the unequal contest vent on until not a red man survived. The Micmacs, from Nova Scotia, aided in the work of extermination. They were the deadfoes of the Bethuks, and gradually the anks of the tribes were thinned; they were lriven from the best hunting grounds, and war and disease lessened their numbers, until o-day not a single representative of the rec men of Newfounland exists.
