so Eloquently Urged the Apostle of the Move Mrs. Susan B. Anthony, the apostle of woman's rights, appeared before a fair sized audience in Shaftesbury Hall last night, to lecture on her favorite subject. Shortly after eight o'clock Mayor Clarke came on the platform with the lady lecturer on his arm, folowed by Mrs. Curzan, Mrs. McDonald, Mrs. Dr. Parker, Mrs. Fawcett, Mrs. D. V. Lucas,

Mrs. D. Gullen and Mrs. Jacob Sheveen. Rev. D. A. Sutherland and Dr. Parker were called from the audience to take seats on the

Mayor Clarke briefly introduced the lecturer. He turned some fine phrases about women and their influence, but said nothing to commit himself on the woman's franchise to commit himself on the woman's franchise and talk intelligently and with considerable force. The audience, including Farmer Smith of East York, listened attentively so her discourse. She maintained that the franchise was a great civilizing agency, and its being withheld from any intelligent class of the community tended to the degradation of society and social disorder. Every extension of the franchise tended directly to elevate the class on whom it was conferred. She sketched the progress of the woman's crights movement in England, showing that women there, as here, voted in municipal and school elections, and not only that but est on public school boards. She thought that the time would soon come when they would vote in the general elections. The opponents of woman's enfranchisement argued that if such were brought about that it would be productive of riots. She failed to see why the presence of pure, graceful, lovely woman at the polling booths would make men behave worse than they do now. It was further urged that women would vote with their husbands and that practically the vote would be arged that women would vote with their husels hands and that practically the vote would be duplicated. That, then, did away with the other argument which maintained thatwoman's defranchisement would create discord in the family circle. [Laughter.]

The lecturer went into detail to show that if woman was to get her rights she must first be enfranchised. Once possessing the voting power politicians would disten to her and lecislate for her. She asservated that woman's enfranchisement would be a great blessing; that it would uplift society. "Eyen in the distribution of society," she said; "woman is always to be found a shade higher than man."
