As American corn bears the same relation to our farmers' inrests as Canadian barley bears to American farmers' interests, their corn should be taxed the same as they tax our barley, which would raise the price of oats and rye and treble the home consumption of barley, and perforce the distillers would give us a more wholesome which as you make the price of the distillers would give us a more wholesome whisky, as you state, than now.
