




Decision of the Supreme Court In th Pardoning Power Case - Duncan Mc Gibbon Made County Judge of Peel-Canadian Grain At the Midwinter Fair-tieneral Ottawa Gossip.

OTTAWA, March 13. -- Ottawa to-night is beginning to put on its usual sessional appearance, and every incoming train brings its quota of members. Hon. Peter White, Speaker of the Commons, and Col. Smith, ergeant-at-Arms, were in their offices today making final arrangements for the opening on Thursday, and there is a general buzz of preparation about the building. Hon. Mr. Laurier and Madame Laurier arrived this Laurier and Mademe Laurier arrived this morning and took up their customary quar-ters at the Russell, and a large number of members and senators are expected by to-morrow's morning and evening trains. The present indications are that there will be a larger number than usual of the members of both Houses present at the opening. This being Lord Aberdeen's first year it was ex-pected that the opening would be more than usually gay, but although there will be the customary guard of honor and escort and assemblage of Ottawa's elite on the floor of the Chamber, the death of Lady Aberdeen's father has cast a gloom over the festivities and they will be shorn somewhat of the splendor which they were expected to assume. The Pardoning Power Case. Two important cases were disposed of in the Supreme Court to-day. They are the Ross Will Case and the Pardoning Power Case. Justices Fournier, Taschereau, Gwynne, Sedgwick and King were on the bench. In the case of the Attorney-General of Canada v. the Attorney-General of Ontario, judgment was given dismissing the appeal with costs, Justice Gwynne dis-senting. This question arose out of the constitutionality of an Ontario statute, which gave power to the province or to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council to par-don in cases which arose under provincial statutes.
