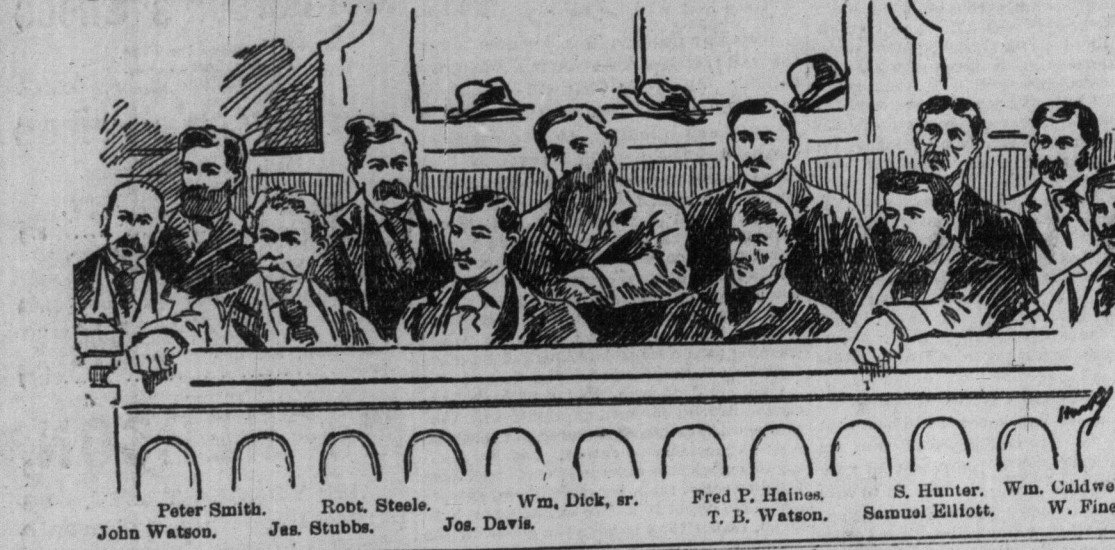

RAMPTON, March 13.—The trial of Walter MacWherrell and John Walker on a charge of murdering James Williams is now in full swing. Although the counsel for the defendants exhausted 39 of the 40 peremptory challenges they were entitled to and the Crown requested 10 to stand aside the jury was selected within an hour. The defence challenged every juror from Toronto Township, the locality of the murder, and every man who had passed his 60th year except in the case of the second last juror chosen. He probably would have suffered the same fate but that the defence had not one challenge left, except for cause, and like the constable who saw the head of a boa constrictor enter at his bedroom window, they did not know what might follow.
