LA GASCOGNE IS SAFE

Eight Days Overdue, But Arrived With All Well on Board.

BROKEN PISTON ROD DELAYED HER

Sighted By Only One Schooner During Her Trip.

Four Times the Piston Rod Broke and the Boat Had to Anchor While Repairs Were Made-The Passengers Were Nover in Danger and the Bad Weather Did Not Bother Them-Story of the Trip-Previous Mishaps to the French Liner.

New York, Feb. 11.-La Gascogne is safe. The big French liner, eight days overdue, dropped anchor at the Bar just before midnight, all well on board, and a sigh of relief goes up from two continents.

The delay was due to a broken piston rod and to the terrific gales which have swept the North Atlantic for the past other week or more and brought disaster to many a staunch craft. Capt. Baudelon ERBY" Plug more profit " costs them "Derby Cap," , are on each 185

From the time they left Havre, on Jan. 26, until to-day, they spoke no trans-Atlantic steamer, and saw only a four-masted schooner, the one which report-ed at St. Pierre Miquelon as having seen a large steamer off the banks apparently in distress hast Saturday. 


