The new Gold Coinage .- A referious system has been carried on for some time, of defrauding the public by plugging the gold coin of the realm, which is effected in the following manner:-From the rim towards the centre of a sovereign, several holes are drilled with a very fine with an inferior metal, so as to deceive the most experienced judges. By this process a sovereign is rendered, in many instances, not worth more than 17s., and a half soveroign not more than 8s6d or 9s. Government has been obliged, in order to put a stop to this fraud, to direct a new coinage to be issued. For the last forthight, the Master of the Mint and the assayer have been busily engaged in witnessing many experiments, with a view to prevent the abstraction of the gold taking place without immediate detection. Yesterday the workmen commenced casing the new comage, which will be shortly issued to the public. The expense will be very great, but Government has been obliged to incur it, in consequence file system above alluded to having much injured the credit and confidence in the value of our gold, not only at home but on the continent.
