A PRETTY HARVEST HOME AT ANGLESEA SQUARE CHURCH.

In the quaint little Anglican chapel, in Anglesea Square, the annual harvest festival was held on Sunday afternoon, September 24th. Within, all looked bright and peaceful, and it would be difficult to find a more beautiful offering than that which decorated the mission on that occasion. In the front of the hall resting on the floor, and towering high in all their autumn glory, was a "bank" of flowers, vegetables and fruits, while higher than all the rest, more symbolic and majestic stood the noble cornstalk—its golden tassels unfurled. The Rev. H. Pollard preached the thanksgiving sermon in words beautiful yet simple, showing the many

lessons taught by the harvest, the constancy of God, His plenteous mercy, the harvest hereafter—when the sunshine shall be the light of God, and the beauty His presence.

The children also brought bouquets of flowers, which were collected by two of the little ones and placed with the other offerings. Afterwards the flowers were taken to the sick and the fruit and vegetables will be sent to the Protestant Hospital.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The monthly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, took place on Tuesday, September 26th at St. John's Hall. Mrs. Grant Powell occupying the chair in the absence of the President. The most important feature of the meeting, beyond the usual business, was the resolution of condolence tendered to Mrs. Muckleston, in which was expressed not only the sympathy of the meeting with a sister's sorrow, but also its sense of the great loss the church has sustained in the death of a young man who, as we all hoped, would in the future, have formed one of the able men of the ministry.

A life membership in the W. A., together with a gold badge, was also presented to Mrs. Muckleston as a parting gift from her friends in this association, to whose success she has so much contributed.

The destination of the fall boxes of clothing, was determined at this meeting. They will be packed early in November.

BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW.

On Thursday September 7th, a joint chapter meeting of the local chapters of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew was held in St. John's School room, at which there were present a large number of the Brotherhood and several of the clergy. The chair was taken by Mr. M. W. Maynard, of St. Alban's. Reports were made by the respective chapters represented at the meeting upon their individual work and difficulties, after which addresses were delivered by Mr Spencer Waugh, of Toronto, the General Secretary of the Brotherhood, upon "The Rule of Prayer," by Mr. W. H. Morgan, jr. of St. George's chapter, upon "How to arouse a greater interest in the work among our own members," and by the Rev. Mr. MacKay, of St. John's, on "How to deal with boys after confirmation." Each address was followed by a general discussion in which a large number of those present took part. It was felt at the close, that the meeting had been very successful, and it is hoped that the different chapters may be able to fraternize in this way more frequently in future.

The local chapters intend to hold a joint service on St. Andrew's Day, as was done last year. The Rev. J. C. Roper, of St. Thomas' Toronto, will be the preacher at the evening service on that day.
