LONDON, April 9.—Parnell, at Birmingham, yesterday, said he would consult his colleagues and give the League his view of the Land Bill in his speech at Cork on Sunday.

CORK, April 9.—Parnell at a banquet here this evening traced the history of the Land League. He denounced the desertion of seventeen members from the Irish party as the cause of the Coercion Bill.
