#### **IMMIGRATION**

Ms. Barbara Greene (Don Valley North): Mr. Speaker, I am pleased to table a petition from residents of my riding and other areas of metropolitan Toronto urging the minister of immigration to issue minister's permits for spouses and dependent children of persons who have been determined to be convention refugees and allow these families to be reunited in Canada for inland processing.

If this were done, we would limit tragic situations such as the four Gunajothy children between the ages of 5 and 12 who have been waiting for three years in a hotel room in Colombo in terror, without a permanent care giver, while their parents achieved refugee status and were landed last June.

It is six months now that they have been sponsored and they have not even received medical instructions. These children will be Canadian citizens and they will remember their years of fear, loneliness and waiting.

Hon. Marcel Masse (Minister of National Defence): The naval reserve facility at Pointe-à-Carcy, Quebec, will house three organizations: The Naval Reserve Headquarters, HMCS Montcalm and the Canadian Forces Fleet School Quebec.

(a) Canadian Forces Fleet School Quebec and HMCS Montcalm are expected to handle up to 1,500 trainees a year.
