national, and Conservative International. At the last meeting in Cyprus, Senator Nurgitz tells me, one delegate from Poland was with the Conservative International group.

These episodes reflect the pluralistic attitude emerging in eastern Europe. It would be interesting to see what develops in the future and what impact this change in voting patterns will have on the deliberations of the Union.

I believe I would be remiss in my duty if I did not acknowledge the very able assistance that was provided to our delegation by Mrs. Barbara Reynolds. She has a firm grasp of the workings of the Union, which she has acquired over the past four years. Her knowledge was very valuable to the delegation. The delegation was very ably assisted also by its executive secretary, Mr. Peter Hucal. Mr. Hucal, who became the executive secretary this year, was responsible for coordinating the day-to-day logistics of the delegation. All of us were impressed with the efficient and dignified manner in which he carried out his responsibilities.

I hope, honourable senators, that I have been able to impress upon you the very important work that goes on at the ITU conferences.

The Hon. the Speaker pro tempore: Honourable senators, if no other senator wishes to speak, this inquiry is considered debated.
