Sir Arthur W. Currie December 5, 1930. graduate students who are employing the balance of their time in candidacies for advanced degrees. But this, after all, is quite different from a program of scholarships or fellowships with all the publicity which is commonly attendant upon the administration of such awards. I trust this restriction on the use of any funds the Foundation may make available will not upset any plans you have been developing. It does not seem to me that the restriction imposes any serious obstacles in the way of the satisfactory promotion of significant research activities on the part of the permanent staff. Please let me know if I have made myself clear, or if you would like to discuss the matter further. We shall be glad to send your office a wire following the meeting of our Board of Trustees on the tenth of the month. Meanwhile you have again my hearty best wishes for your trip.
